Deirdre Alexander Anticipating Spending A Month In Goeborte, Sweden

Eleven-year-old Deirdre Alexander is happily anticipating spending a month in Goeborte, Sweden, this summer as a selected participant in the Children's International Summer Village (CISV) International Association.

A resident of Upper Mar'boro, Maryland, Deirdre is the daughter of former Charlotteans, Benjamin Alexander and Jackie Belton-Alexander and she is the grand-daughter of Mable, and Rollie Belton of Charlotte.

From July 3 until the 30, she will live in Sweden, spending weekdays in a dormitory setting (with three other children from the Washington, D.C., Metropolitan area and a counselor-traveling companion) and weekends with a Swedish host family.

The purpose of CISV is to bring children of different nationalities together to instill in them an appreciation of other cultures and teach them the value of living amicably with one another in the interest of peace and understanding.

Earlier this year Deidre and her mother became awars of CISV while.

mother became aware of CISV while attending the International Bazaar at the Convention Center in Washington, D.C. Deirdre filled out an application for the CISV Selection Committee; it required recom-mendations from her teacher and mendations from her teacher and principal and a portion had to be completed by her parents; then she took part in an oral interview. Afterwards, she waited to be notified by mail. Thirty children were competing for the 12 openings with CISV this year.

"I couldn't wait to get the letter," remembers Deirdre, "I tried to forget about it sometimes. But I kept bugging my mother a lot."

"I knew they (the selection committee) were going to watch the way I acted with the other children," says Deirdre. "I talked with everyone and we all played games."

She did well enough to become one of the four children destined for Sweden. The other eight children in the program will be going to Costa Rica and Argentina, four to each country.

Starting this month, Deirdre will meet with her counselor every other Sunday until July, to prepare for her trip. She will be learning about Sweden and a little of the

language.

Her involvement in CISV and the fact of the trip have also made Deirdre a hometown celebrity. "All my friends were really happy," she points out. "And my teacher was rooting for me all the time I was waiting for my letter. When it came, she gave a copy of it to the principal, who announced it to the whole school over the intercom!"

CISV is a family-oriented organ-ization and the parents of the chil-dren are encouraged to participate in its many functions. They host meetings at their homes and take meetings at their homes and take part in, especially, promoting CISV and recommending other children to the program. The children, from now on called "Villagers," are also persuaded to remain with the organization after their CISV trip. They can go on to become Junior Counsellers at age 16. nsellors at age 14.

Deirdre, who says she wants to be "famous" when she grows up, believes C'SV will make a big difference in her life. "I'll be able to keep the friends I make in Sweden, I can become a junior counsellor, and I'll remember it as one good thing that I've done in my life," she

relates.

Thinking of her mother and sister, Lauren, six, both of whom she'll be away from for a month this summer, Deirdre comments, "I'll send them a postcard and I might call collect. I'll miss them but I won't be sad because I'll be with other papers my age." other people my age."




