Sex And Headaches: A New Approach To An Old Refrain

Not tonight, dear, I have a head-ache," is one of the most famous excuses ever uttered. Laughed at by most as a funny joke, it is nonethe-less a serious problem to many men and women, possibly as many as 250,000. This age old problem of headaches associated with the sexual act now has a medical name "benign sexual

cephalagia," which is described as a severe migraine headache during sex usually occurring at or slightly after orgasm.

A study by Dr. Donald Johns, a Boston neurologist, said that the headaches may last a few minutes to 24 hours and can even be associated with nausea and vomiting. These attacks may strike at any time and then vanish as mysteriously as thy began. Such unpredictability has

made it difficult to find solutions. However, there may be a fairly simple answer to this perplexing


"Bizarre aches and pains in vari-ous portions of the body are gener-ally psychosomatic. Migraine head-aches are psychosomatic and, with the others, are uniformly cured by Diametic therapy," said L. Rén Hub-bard in his New York Times best selling book DIANETICS: THE

MODERN SCIENCE OF MENTAL HEALTH."

What Hubbard found, while developing his Dianetics technology, is that a person's mind contains "engrams" which are "a complete recording, down to the last accurate details, of every perception present in a moment of partial or full 'unconsciousness'" and these en-grams also contain physical pain. This discovery, coupled with his

Sets Record

Systemwide, The Piedmont Commuter operated by CCAIR, Inc. set a year-round traffic record of 380,229 passengers carried in 1986 for a 225% increase compared to 1985.
