# First Time Home Buyers Can Apply For 8.3% Mortgage Loans

Raleigh - First-time North Carolina home buyers can apply immediately for a limited number of 8.3% mortgage loans from par-ticipating lenders as a result of a \$6.6 million reallocation of bond funds by the N.C. Housing Finance Agency, according to In-terim Executive Director Edwin Caldwell Jr.

The 29-year, fixed-rate mort-

gage loans are available to lowand moderate-income families and individuals on a first-come, first-served basis through 71 lenders located in 35 cities and towns across the state.

To qualify, applicants need a five percent cash down payment and a sales contract on a new or existing single family house, condominium, townhome or

manufactured home. The pros-pective buyer cannot have owned a home for the past three years. In addition, copies of federal income tax forms for the last three years are required.

For a family of two to four members, annual gross income in urban areas may not top \$34,200; in rural areas, \$32,000 for single individuals, income limits are set

at \$25,650 in urban areas and \$24,000 in rural regions. Purchase price limitations, set by the federal government, include: \$97,240 for new homes and \$90,640 for existing homes in Wake, Durham, Orange and Franklin counties; \$91,630 for new homes and \$91,850 for exist-ing homes in Cabarrus, Rowan, Union, Mecklenburg, and Lincoln counties; \$84,700 for new homes and \$75,460 for existing homes in Stokes, Yadkin, For-syth, Guilford, Randolph, David-son, and Davie counties; and \$79,860 for new homes and \$67,549

for existing homes in remaining North Carolina counties.

The North Carolina Housing finance Agency was created by the state legislature in 1978.
