* Close draperies, curtains and shades to keep the house as cool as

Unplus all clocks, radios and

televisions. Although they use little power, if you plan to be away for a long period of time, these small users can add up. And don't forget clocks on microwave ovens and VCRs.

* Dehumidifiers that do not have a drain hose or an automatic shut-off should be disconnected.

And, finally, have neighbors check your home every few days.

Leave instructions about what to do if a problem arises where the fuse or breaker box is located, phone numbers for your plumber.

* Be patient when you return home. Turning the air conditioner thermostat to the lowest setting will not cool the house any faster, and you'll waste energy.




