Evans Plans Bid For District Court Judge

lot of things, but now she's ready for a new challenge-being

ready for a new challenge-being a District Court judge.

Evans, 36, plans to run in the May Democratic primary for the seat currently held by Shirley Fulton, who plans to run for a newly-created Superior Court seat in Mecklenburg County.

Since graduating from Duke University Law School and passing the state bar exam, Evans has been an attorney at

Evans has been an attorney at the firm of Ferguson, Stein, Watt, Wallace and Adkins. Her general experience as a counse-lor included handling education suits, misdemeanor crime and

Evans said 11 years of work before the bench as a lawyer has given her the incentive to

try for a career behind it.
"I feel like I've had experience
in District Court in Mecklenburg County and around the state that has prepared me," she said.

Evans is probably best known as the attorney for the Westside Coalition Against the Garbage Dump, a Charlotte-based organization founded last year to keep the county from locating a recycling center in a black neighborhood.

Evans sought and received an injunction that prevents the county from building the facility until federal judge James McMillan hears the case. Evans said she doean't beleive the case will affect her election bid, re-

She is also a member of the N.C. Association of Black Lawyers, N.C. Association of Black Lawyers, N.C. Association of Women Attorneys and the Academy of Trial Lawyers.

Locally, Evans has served on several boards, including the Charlotte Speech and Hearing Center, Planned Parenthood of



Charlotte and the YWCA. Evans received her undergrad-uate degree from Wellesley (Mass.) College in 1973.
