Contrary to what you might think, riding the bus isn't complicated.

In fact, it's incredibly simple.

CATCHING THE BUS

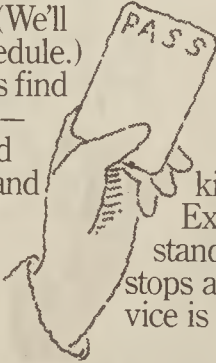


Before you do anything, we suggest you call us at 336-3366 and describe where you live and where you'd like to go.

From that information, we can recommend the correct bus route for you and tell you what time to catch it. (We'll even send you a free route schedule.)

Then, all you have to do is find one of our bus stops near you — marked by our green, blue and white Charlotte Transit sign — and wait for your bus. As a bus approaches, check the route number and destination sign above the windshield to make sure you get the right bus.

Be sure to be at your bus stop at least five minutes early with exact change. All schedule times may vary as much as five minutes from the times indicated, due to traffic and weather conditions. However, Charlotte Transit buses arrive within this five minutes 96% of the time.



TYPES OF SERVICE

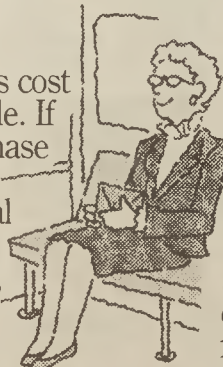
Charlotte Transit offers two kinds of bus service: Local and Express. Local bus service is standard service which includes stops all along a route. Express service is specially

designed for people who work up-town and need a fast, convenient ride to work from outlying residential areas. After several designated stops on the route, these buses travel nonstop to the up-town area during rush hours.



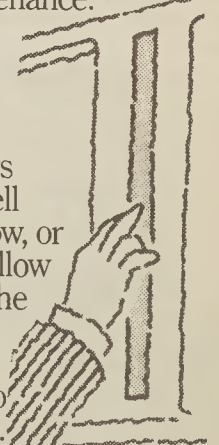
COST

All Local routes cost just 70¢ per ride. If you prefer, you may purchase a Weekly Local Pass for \$6.00. Or a Monthly Local Pass for \$25.00. Express routes cost \$1.00 per ride, or you may purchase a Monthly



STOPPING THE BUS

As the bus nears your stop, pull the bell cord above the window, or press the black or yellow vinyl strip between the windows (on newer buses) to signal the driver that you wish to get off at the next stop.
