...].868 teenagers drop out of school. Without a high school diploma and the ability to read and work, our young people will find it difficult to be able to find a job. And any job they do find will often not pay them enough to enable them to raise a family out of poverty when they are ready.

... <u>988 children are abused.</u> Parents who cannot cope with their problems, which often stem from poverty, frequently vent their frustrations on their own children. The resulting scars can last a lifetime.
