Valence was formed on the campus of Johnson C. Smith University (JCSU) back in 1980.

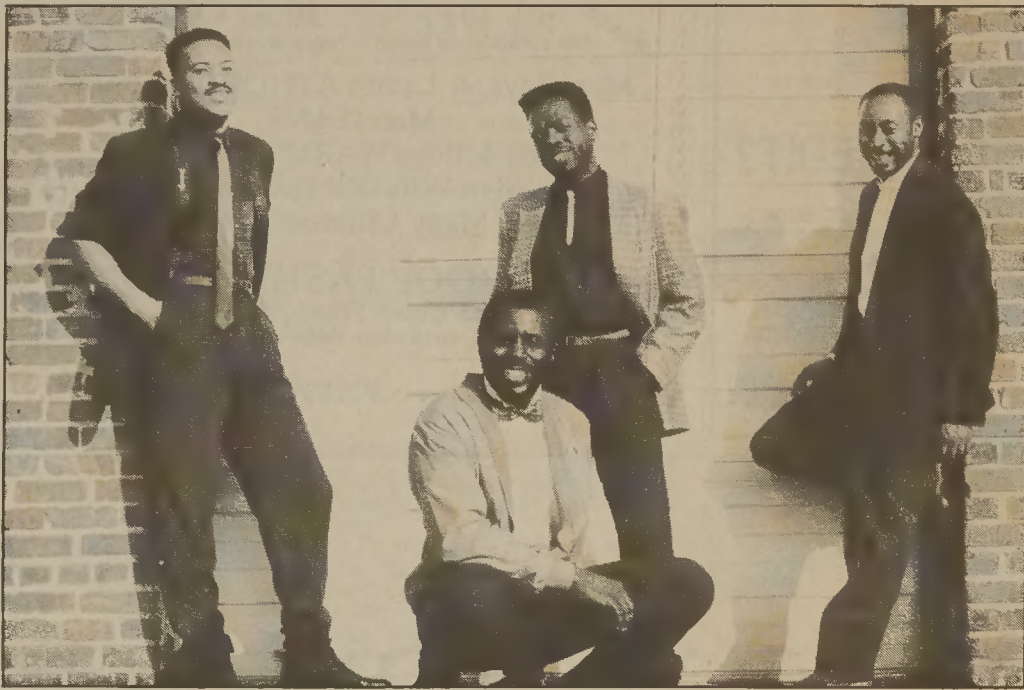
They soon became campus favorites for their performances of both original and popular music. They were regulars in local schools and nightclubs as a result.

Valence seems loaded with talent and promise. Their efforts produce true sweat at every performance.

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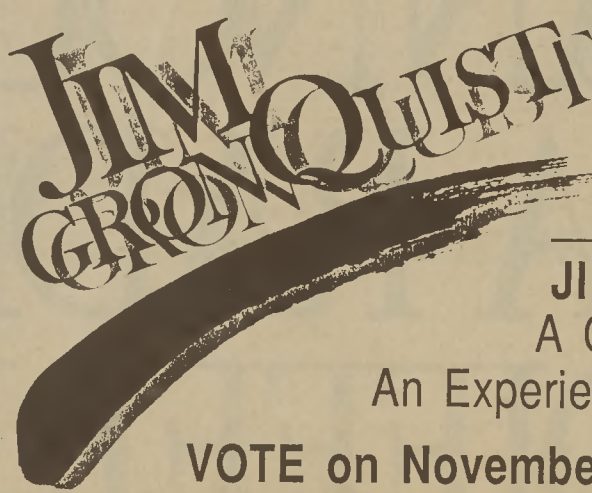

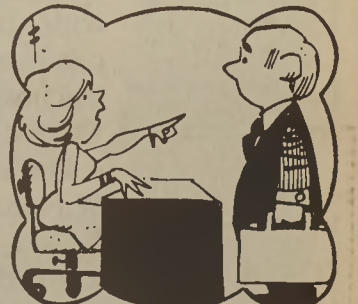
