Speaks At Johnson C. Smith Chairman McColl

Recently, McColl has taken to speaking out on the status of Charlotte Mecklenburg's public schools. Several times he has voiced his opinions on this matter, agreeing with a report by the Charlotte Chamber of Com-merce that stated there should be more involvement and support for education from businesses in the area.

At Johnson C. Smith, McColl took the opportunity to discuss at length his opinions about education and the future of schools

in the southern region.

He began his lecture with a personal anecdote that spoke to the economic expansion of the south. McColl related, "In the past, a southerner's search for a better life meant packing up and heading north. When it came time for college and career, I did exactly that. I left home in Bennettsville, South Carolina and journeyed north, all the way to North Carolina. North Carolina. As I like to say, I came 12 miles north and 88 miles west.

Over the years, McColl continued, "clearly we've made tremendous strides. It really doesn't take an MBA from Harvard to take an MBA from Harvard to figure out that the economic growth of the region has been a catalyst of growth for NCNB. All elements of our inner structure rank among the very best in the country. Without question, we are certainly above average in

every category.

"That is, all except one,"
McColl pointed out. "In our
march toward prosperity, we
have quite frankly overstepped our schools.

"We've all got to wake up to the fact that the crisis in our schools is paying the way for the crisis in our communities," McColl stressed to the audience. "That's why dealing with this crisis is the obligation of every member of the community, not that the teachers and dealers. just the teachers and administrators. As the saying goes, if you're not part of the solution, then you're part of the problem."

McColl went on to lament the status of education today, par-ticularly as it pertains to how we regard teaching professionals.
"Teaching is one career that I can think of where you get absolutely no rewards for doing a great job and no punishment for an inferior performance," he

Stressing the importance of education in preparation for the modern workplace, McColl explained, "Careers will consist of six or seven job changes within a working lifetime and educa-tion will be a lifelong process of training and retraining.

"Simply put, the process for the uneducated are dismal. In moving forward, McColl ad-monished the audience, con-cluding, "for too long, we've bashed educators for the failure of our schools. The fact is we are all guilty for the inadequacies of our system. Progress never comes from pointing fingers and passing the buck.
"We all have a role to play in

improving the current state of our schools."
