Art Teachers Visit Historic Egypt

Dr. Esther Page Hill, associate professor of visual arts at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte, and Mrs. June Hood, elementary art teacher in the Charlotte-Mecklenburg schools, traveled to Cairo, Egypt, on December 30, 1988 to attend an international art conference. The week-long second Middle East and Africa Regional Conference of the International Society for Education in Art (INSEA) focused upon the theme Art Education and Local Tradition.

The paintings and drawings and slides of greater than life figures of kings and queens shown were the students' interpretation and responses to the Ramesses II Exhibit currently at the Mint Museum in Charlotte. Each piece was accompanied by a personal statement by the student. Themes range from: If I were in Egypt, Things I would carry with me in the next life, Jewelry I could wear, Decorating a coffin top for a Pharaoh, Egyptian foods I like.

In addition to the exhibit, Dr. Hill and Mrs. Hood made presentations on January 3, 4:30-6:30 on research projects conducted in Charlotte entitled, Aesthetic Traditions in Art Education. Video accounts of pre-experimental research conducted by four classroom teachers of Charlotte-Mecklenburg: Mrs. Eleanor Doster, Mrs. Robin Gurley, Mrs. Angela Taylor and Mrs. Anne Velezquez, all of Irwin Avenue Open School. All are members of INSEA.

A conference official, Mahonud El Bassionny, expressed great interest and delight about the children's exhibit centered

Burkette Will Speak At Livingstone

Dr. Tyrone Louis Burkette, president of Barber-Scotia College, will be guest speaker for the Livingstone College 1989 Founders Day Observance schedule for Thursday, February 9, at 10 a.m. in Varick Auditorium.

The first observance of Founder's Day was celebrated February 10, 1894, one year after the death of Dr. Joseph Charles Price. Since that time the Thursday nearest his birthday has become a college-wide holiday on which the founder and first president is commemorated for his determination, insight and resourcefulness in making a dream a reality.

Dr. Burkette is a native of Detroit, Michigan, and received a bachelor's degree in sociology from Livingstone, a master's of divinity degree from the Interdenominational Theological Center in Atlanta and a doctor of ministry degree from United Theological Seminary in St. Paul, Minnesota.

He has been a minister in St. Paul, Minnesota, and Portsmouth, Virginia, as well as an instructor of philosophy at Norfolk State University.

Just prior to becoming president of Barber-Scotia, Dr. Burkette, 43, was associate executive of the N.C. Synod of the Presbyterian Church (USA) in Raleigh for four years. In that position, he worked with Presbyterian-supported colleges and their campus ministries. The author of several works, Dr. Burkette is currently a columnist in the "Presbyterian News" a publication of the Presbyterian Church (USA).

On Thursday, January 12, 1989, he became the first black member in the Concord Rotary Club's 67-year history.

Dr. Burkette has two children

-- Michelle age 15, and Gordon age 17. As his schedule permits, he enjoys jazz and model railroading.

Immediately following the convocation there will be a march from Varick Auditorium to the mausoleum of Dr. Price which is located on the east

side of the campus.

Students will also display their talents in an Oratorical Contest focusing on "A Tribute to Dr. Price" on Tuesday, February 7, at 7:30 p.m. in room 203 of the Tubman Building on the campus.

products are used to serve military or police needs. Thus, South Africa easily gets around IBM's ban on sales to the military and police.

est industrial company, "Barlow-Rand seems capable of assuring jobs and livelihood for the ex-IBM employees on its own," Leas said.

IBM also contends that continued sales are needed to assure the livelihood of its 1,500 former employees, for whom IBM set up an independent company when IBM "departed" in 1987. However, the new company has since been taken over by Barlow-Rand, a military contractor and South Africa's larg-

The resolution has also been endorsed by Joseph Lowery, president, Southern Christian Leadership Conference; Damu Smith, executive director, The Washington Office on Africa; Richard Trumka, president, United Mine Workers of America; Robert Edgar, Howard University professor of African studies; Roscoe Nix, president,

Montgomery County NAACP; Rabbi Andrew Baker; Rabbi Jerry Serotta, founder of New Jewish Agenda; The National Black Workers Alliance of IBM Employees; and The African National Congress of South Africa. A strong letter of support has also been received from Anglican Archbishop of Cape Town, Desmond M. Tutu.

The resolution is also co-sponsored by the Interfaith Center on Corporate Responsibility, composed of some 25 Christian religious organizations.
