Mason was informed that The Party Store/Floating Flowers was selected as the sole balloon vendor for Springfest '89. The Party Store/Floating Flowers is in fact two different balloon vendors, operated by whites, that merged and applied as one for the Springfest concession. Mason says although Floating Flowers has participated in Springfest as long as Balloon-A-Grams, The Party Store partipated for the first time last year. As a combined entity, The Party Store/Floating Flowers has no experience as a Springfest vendor, points out Mason.

Citing her four years experience, Mason says, "I feel I should be able to participate. Most vendors with Springfest have grown with Springfest over the years. I am one of the vendors who has proven the ability to handle the capacity crowd that attends the festival."

In an effort to assess the fairness of Springfest's vendor selection process, Alexander for-warded a letter to the organization, dated January 31, asking for specifics, such as: "In what particular respects was The Party Store/Floating Flowers proposal better than that submitted by Balloon-A-Grams? Why was the Balloon-A-Grams proposal not selected? How many vendors, with African-Americans owning a majority interest in the firm, ever have participated in Springfest?"

Springfest, Inc. has not directly answered any of Alexander's

ter, dated February 14, "it is not our practice to justify those decisions to persons who feel aggrieved by them."

Kaufman says, "In present procedures there's nothing that precludes a black vendor from being at Springfest.'

He maintains, "If the question is that we have to insure a certain number (of black vendors) to make Springfest a truly com-munity-wide event, depending upon the input to the Board, maybe something needs to be done. Maybe we indeed have to initiate something that goes be-yond a fair and impartial selection procedure."

Mason says the Springfest Board has received her input. She claims that she talked with Kaufman by telephone on one occasion. "I asked for specific deficiencies in my application.

"He said the choosing of the balloon vendor was a 'subjective, judgement call' --- in exactly those words. He did not invite me to come to talk to him any further on the matter," says Mason. Hence began the correspondence between Mason's attorney and Springfest, Inc.

At this point, all Mason can say is that she still wants to participate as a black vendor at Springfest. "Springfest is supposed to be an event for the en-tire community, held in the heart of Charlotte. But one entire segment of the people of Charlotte is absent from the eco-



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
