WJZY To Air Show On Poverty

CHARLOTTE, NC -- WJZY-TV 46 will air a special on childhood poverty in North Carolina Sunday, March 19 at 10:30 PM. The documentary portion on the special was produced by WRAL-TV, WJZY's sister station in Raleigh. In addition, WJZY-TV will present an open and candid discussion of the special and the problems of childhood poverty immediately following the special.

The special documentary "Every Fourth Child: Two Years Later" deals with the fact that one in four children in North Carolina lives at or below the poverty level. A more accurate number shows 361,158 children in North Carolina live below poverty level. The documentary highlights poverty's effects on several North Carolina children and their families. It also shows

the all too common occurrence of this sometimes never ending cycle of despair, and one family's fight to pull themselves from this economic pit.

Scheduled to appear on the discussion are representatives from the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Urban League, Charlotte Emergency Housing, a family therapist from Family Outreach and Counseling Center, Children's Law Center, University of North Carolina at Charlotte Department

of Human Services, Department of Youth and Family Services, National Black Child Development Institute, Seigle Avenue Presbyterian Church and others.

The special will air Sunday, March 19 at 10:30 PM on WJZY-TV 46. WJZY-TV 46 is Charlotte's leading independent television station and is owned by Capitol Broadcasting Inc. of Raleigh.

The show, taped at The Children's Theatre of Charlotte, will air on Monday, March 13 at 6 p.m.

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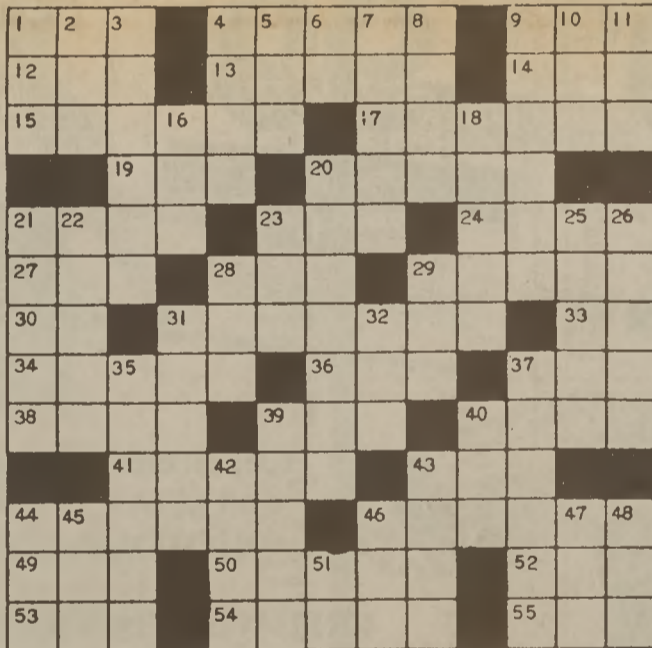
