

JCSU Marks 122 Years Of Education

Saying he was "proud of our 122 years and our graduates all over the world," Johnson C. Smith University President Robert Albright acknowledged Sunday that the University family should be and is indeed proud of its 122 years of service and dedication. Joining Albright in the Founders Day Celebration were several local and state politicians, two former JCSU presidents, alumni members and Dr. Samuel Proctor, pastor, Abyssinian Baptist Church, New York City. Dr. Proctor was the day's distinguished guest and speaker.

President Albright also acknowledged the soon-to-be May graduates who will make up the Class of 1989. Albright called the students dressed in their caps and gowns, "strong, bright, capable men and women who will go forth to make the world a better place."

Remarks were also heard from Tracy Chamblee, student government association president, Mr. Obie Patterson, JCSU president, General Alumni Association, and Rev. Robert Walton, Charlotte-Mecklenburg County Commissioner.

Speaking to his fellow students, Chamblee reminded them, "We are Johnson C. Smith University and this university is us." Obie Patterson said, "We salute the past by remembering our roots."

But, it was Samuel Proctor who most in the overflow crowd in the University Church came to see and hear. Proctor spoke about "The Age of the Computer" and its role and place in today's society. Proctor spoke out against those left in today's world who remain narrow-minded and stuck behind myths

and attitudes that find minorities inferior and computers as replacements for men and women.

Proctor said of those people. "Suppose they were around in 1867 and saw this little school rising up here in Charlotte, training black preachers and teachers; bare-footed grown men, bib-front overalls, with no last names coming up here trying to study Greek and Hebrew philosophy. They would have broken out laughing, wouldn't they?"

He added these same souls would have thought that these students "ought to be following a plow across a field. They never would have believed that here on this day we would be celebrating 122 years of service to the black people, to the nation and to the world. No computer could have seen down the corridors of time to make such a prediction as that."

He had no regrets. He said he and other boycott participants spent the day answering mail and telephone calls and handling other business.

"I would hope that this would raise the level of sensitivity, that when people plan things all segments of the community ... would be involved," Michaux said. "If that's the only thing that comes out of this, I would be satisfied."

Some white legislators also missed the session, though the exact number was unclear because no official roll call was taken. Twenty-six of the 120 House members were granted leaves of absence. The day's only recorded vote was taken in the Senate, and 36 of the 50 members voted.
