Continued From Page 1A kids, this suggests that blacks may inherit an increased response to stress which may explain their higher prevalence of hypertension.

Hypertension, or high blood pressure, is considered a major risk factor for strokes.

The study supports earlier work showing that increased weight, age, resting blood pressure, resting heart rate and inactivity all corresponded to faster heart rates during exercise, Eke-lund said. Another new finding, however, was that for both blacks and whites, there was a strong link between heart rates during exercise and levels of LDL, or low-density cholesterol, found in blood samples. Results of the UNC research

need to be confirmed in the future with a larger study that includes 200 or more black men, Ekelund said. Unfortunately, researchers who designed the Lipid Research Clinics prevalence study did not recruit blacks in numbers greater than their proportion of the population.
