can help. Sponsored as a community service by ear specialist Edward Shaver, MD, Charlotte, this telephone hearing screening test gives the caller a series of tones. If callers do not hear all four tones presented for each ear, they fail the test and should have a more conclusive hearing examination.

To take the free screening test in the Charlotte area, call 333-HEAR from a quiet room using a good quality telephone. The program operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week. For other "DAHST" numbers outside this area, call the "DAHST" Toll-free Information Center at 1-800-222-EARS from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. EST

"Many area residents have used and benefitted from 'DAHST'," said Dr. Shaver. "The screening test is used mostly by friends and family members of a hearing impaired person to con-vince them of their problem."
