### Local Program Wins National Accreditation

Open Door School is among the first pre-school programs in the United States to be accredited by the National Academy of Early Childhood Programs. It is the first pre-school in Charlotte to be so accredited and one of 16 in North Carolina. The Academy recognizes programs which meet national standards of quality in early childhood programs.

Open Door School, located at 234 N. Sharon Amity Road, serves approximately one 100 children from ages two to five, according to its director, Holly Nevill.

"Accreditation helps answer the question, 'What is a quality pre-school program?'" said Dr. Marilyn Smith, executive director of the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC), which sponsors the Academy. "Most parents want to find the highest quality program for their young children, but few parents know how to assess whether a program meets more than just the minimum standards required by state licensing."

The Academy's standards were developed over a three-year period with input from approximately 200 educators and administrators from around the country. It was launched in 1985 by NAEYC, which is the nation's oldest and largest association of early childhood professionals.

"Accreditation is not meant to replace parents' on-site visits to centers as a means for selecting the program that best meets their child's needs," Smith said, "but accreditation does help point out to parents the varied components that should be present in a quality program."

South Eastern's objective is to train people to become professional cosmetologists, manicurists and/or instructors for the state licensing examination.

The licensed professional can work in one of the many related fields, such as: field representative of one of the many companies in the cosmetology industry, manicurist, instructor or salon owner.

The college uses audio visual aids, slides and charts in their educational program. All facilities are housed in one building which incorporates class and

lecture rooms, practical and clinical training areas (modeled to resemble the standard salon design), dispensary, supply rooms, office, a separate instruction room and student lounges.

South Eastern College of Beauty Culture offers the following courses of study: Cosmetology, Manicuring, Instructor Training.

The school admits as regular students high school graduates or the recognized equivalent thereof. High school graduates should provide transcripts, diploma, General Education Development (GED) Certificate, or over age 16 and have the ability to benefit from the training. This ability to benefit is determined by passing our entrance test. Provide us with a letter of recommendation from your high school principal, parent or guardian.

The Instructor Training course requires a high school diploma or GED and a valid North Carolina Cosmetology license.

On the basis of personal interview with a staff member an aptitude and dexterity test, a limited number of special students can be admitted.

Personal interviews and tours of the facilities are required.

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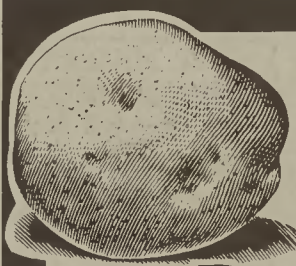
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
