OVATION! A DALLAS SALUTE TO BLACK COMPOSERS includes a major exhibition, concerts and lectures, occurring in numerous locations in the Dallas downtown Arts District be-ginning September 1.

"The body of work of black composers, although largely from this century, has gone vir-tually unrecognized as a major catalyst and contribution to the world of music," said OVATION! Coordinator Vicki Meek. "OVATION! brings the first ma-jor photographic exhibition on black composers together with concerts and talks by experts in the fields. Furthermore, interest from academicians and the Smithsonian Institute indicate that this project will take on a life of its own - bringing permanent and lasting recognition in ongoing exhibitions and in documents of record," she said.


