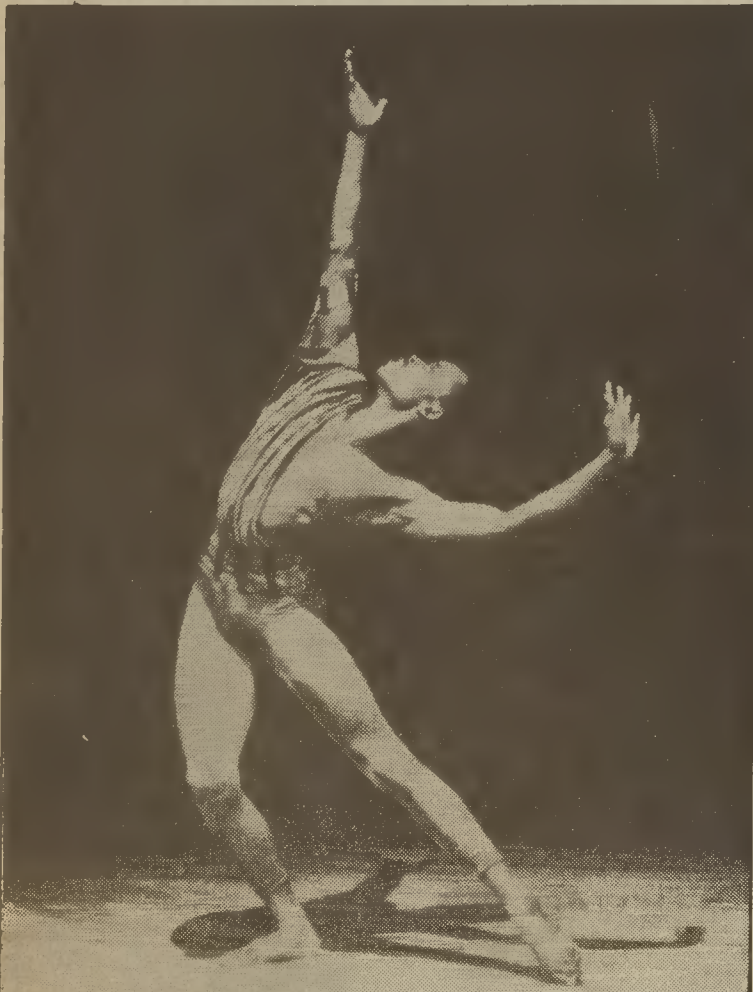

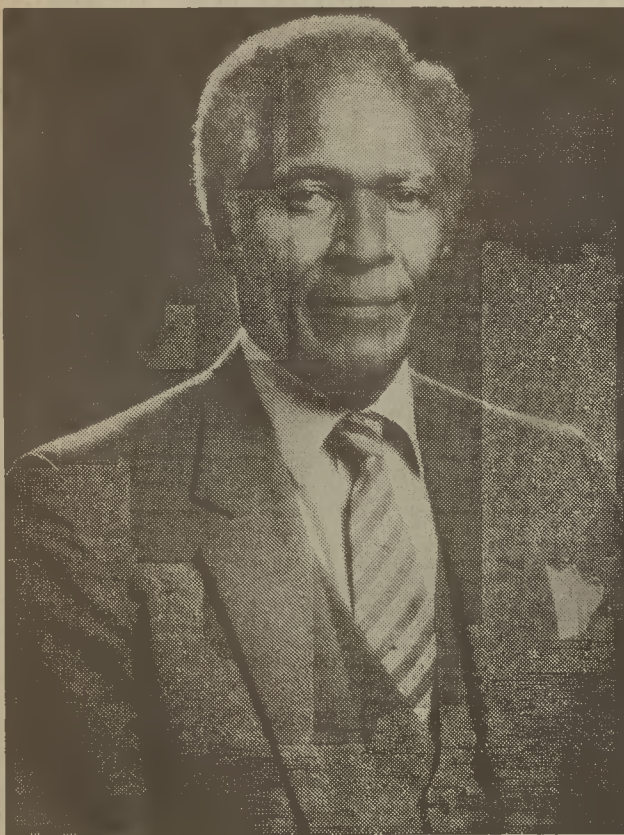

SUMMARY OF DANNELLY'S CITY COUNCIL COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT ACTIVITIES IN DISTRICT 2

- Over the past three fiscal years the City has provided assistance in the amount of \$2,825,810 to Rehabilitate 222 units.
- During fiscal year 1988, 1,160 Housing Code Enforcement inspections were made and 1,106 code cases were completed.
- During the past three years over 200 households received relocation assistance or housing counseling.
- Over \$1,890,000 in physical improvements were constructed and/or approved.
- The City Sold 17 parcels of land in District 2 generating proceeds of \$1.2 million.
- Twelve loans totaling \$765,420 were made through Economics Development Revolving Loan Fund over the last 3 fiscal years.
- The McDonalds Hotel received \$500,000 loan from the Development and Revitalization Fund in 1988.
- Economic Development activites resulted in the creation of 107 jobs.
