

"Baldness, for the man who is bothered by it, can be a very emotional, psychological and traumatic issue," said Pignataro.

Tom Cash is a professor of psychology at Old Dominion University in Norfolk, Va., and the author of a book on selfimage called "What Do You See When You Look in the Mirror?" He says hair loss is commonly seen by men as a loss of virility and power.

"They believe their hair loss diminishes their attractiveness," Cash said.

But men who suffer from baldness should look at the risks and benefits of any procedure like Pignataro's.

One 30-year-old man from Buffalo, who wished to remain anonymous, said he started losing his hair when he was about 20 and started wearing a hairpiece soon after.
