



He was the Panthers' best receiver over the final half of the season after regaining the starting job when rookie Muhsin Muhammad went down with a hamstring injury. Green finished the season with 46 catches for 614 yards and three touchdowns. The sevenvear veteran says it's important the Panthers keep the nucleus together.

"The key to this team is to get the guys back that are here now because we've all jelled together and we've got, I don't know, 20, 25, 30 guys who are free agents for next year," he said. "It's either going to rebuild or keep the guys that we have. I hope I'm around and we're all back because I know there's going to be some changes but the majority of us I feel can contribute well to this team next year, not only on the field but off the field as well.'

The oldest Panther, 37-year old inside linebacker Sam Mills, said he will be back next




starting spot in the Pro Bowl. Mills was also on a winning playoff team for the first time in his 11 year career, but falling a game short of the

hard to take. "It hurts a lot with me because I don't know when I'll take the field again (in the playoffs)," he said. "But I plan on coming back. The Panthers know they must upgrade some key positions through free agency if they want to be good enough to





advance to the Super Bowl. Speed is an area Carolina must address on both sides of the ball. General Manager Bill Polian said the Panthers would have to make significant improvement to advance to the Super Bowl. "It's pretty hard to tell at this

point in time," he said. "You lick your wound...and assess it, but I think there's no question that Green Bay was the better team, by a pretty wide margin Sunda. If we're going to play at their level and they are the benchmark, we have a ways to go."
