Police and fire types had no reason to think the call was serious, Jacobson said, but everyone took it for real. Although DSS staff folks complained they weren't told straight up about the threat, Jacobson defends the county's policy to keep the evacuation on the down-low. To make sure no one would get hurt, a second evacuation was called 15 minutes before the caller's threat was supposed to become reality. Jacobsen said he and a posse of security folks went in and

searched the joint again. "I'm not going to be the one in there to see the building blow up at 3 o'clock," Jacobsen said.
