"I think I will wind up talking to some people in the (county) delegation, but I'm not going to torpedo it," he said

Opponents also point to the need for street repair and more police officers as more pressing than funding arts projects. But Wachovia Corp., which is planning a South Tryon Street campus of cultural facilities, wanted an answer quickly. Three arts projects - a 1,200-seat theater, new Mint Museum and modern-art museum -

would go on the Wachovia property as part of a "synthetic" TIF where the city would help finance part of the construction through new property taxes the project is expected to generate.

The car rental tax, if approved, would raise an expected \$80.7 million for the programs. Among the facilities that would benefit from the arts plan is the Afro-American Cultural Center, which would get \$17.9 million to expand

The car rental tax will likely face a grilling because of who'll wind up footing the bill. Although supporters insist out-of-town visitors will foot the bill, opponents and car-rental operators counter an increase will impact Charlotte residents who rent cars most

"If you're going to raise the

tax from 11 percent to 15 or 16 percent like Raleigh did, you might want to consider using it on roads," Tabor

Earle agrees.


