LEXINGTON, Ky.-A Christian youth group and the city of Lexington are in a dispute over the church's desire to feed the poor and homeless at a downtown park on Sunday afternoons.

Youth ministers from Hill-n-Dale Christian Church, mainly college students, have been bringing food to Phoenix Park every week for more than two years. Church members say it's their Christian duty and their legal right to serve the poor

Aaron Allen, a Transylvania student and Hill-n-Dale homeless ministry volunteer, said some in Lexington are uncomfortable not with the program, but who it serves.

They'd rather sweep it. under the rug and put it in a part of the city where the white upper-class suburbia can kind of ignore" homelessness, he said.

Lexington's parks and recreation department wants a Christian youth group to stop.

Deputy director Bill Carman told the church this week that the charitable workers could be violating city park and health codes.

But, Carman said, he can do little if the church operates in the park without a proper city per-

"If people just choose to ignore the law, what do you do? Arrest the church?" he asked

Mayoral spokesman Bruce Edwards said the church might be legally entitled to serve food in a public park.

Phoenix Park is a one-acre spot where the homeless often congregate and is next to the Lexington Public Library and Park Plaza Apartments. Park Plaza residents and library workers have complained about the hungry throngs

Park officials worry about the lack of restroom facilities and they say litter is a problem when homeless people eat in the

The church estimates that 75 to 100 people eat lunch at the park each Sunday. Carman puts the number at Hill-n-Dale


