New Orleans Archdiocese shutters historic church

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NEW ORLEANS—The Archdiocese of New Orleans announced Monday that it would close one of the nation's oldest black Catholic churches for the foreseeable future after protesters interrupted Mass on Sunday

Protesters, most of whom are not members of St. Augustine's, have been occupying the rectory for a week, saying they will not leave until the parish is reinstated. Archbishop Alfred Hughes, during a news conference,

during a news conference, said he had no choice but to close St. Augustine Church because protesters had dese-crated it by interrupting Mass It cannot be reopened, he said, until it is consecrated

he said, until it is consecrated again.

He also ordered those holed up in the rectory to immediately vacate the property He did not indicate what steps would be taken if the protesters did not voluntarily leave.

The parish at St. Augustine's was slated to be merged with larger St Peter Claver. It wasn't to have its own priest or membership, but the church itself was to remain open for Mass and occasional weddings or funerals until Monday's announcement.

The consolidation was announced as part of the archdiocese's effort to deal

with \$84 million in uninsured losses following Hurricane Katrina, but Hughes said Monday that the primary concern was not financial. St. Augustine's had failed to add many new members or carry on other pastoral functions required of a parish, Hughes said

"This is a very painful, painful decision to have to make and to implement. I don't take any joy in this," he

He also said the church has not been treated any different from others in the archdio-

But St. Augustine's has

drawn a lot of attention because it is among the nation's oldest Roman Catholic parishes, founded by white and free people of color in 1841. The free black members of the congregation bought pews in the church so slaves could attend Mass.

The Treme neighborhood church, which had about 350 families before Hurricane Katrina, remains a racially diverse congregation.

"We're all one We're diversi-

fied. We're as close to utopia as you get here. There is no color," said parishioner Doretha Augustus, who was standing outside the church where signs were posted saying "Save our parish" and "We.shall not be moved." Parishioners have appealed the decision and plan to take their case to the Vatican if Hughes refuses to overturn the decision.

Sandra Gordon, the president of St. Augustine's pas-

toral council, said that in the meantime, parishioners and protesters would stay at the church.

"We will continue to peacefully occupy the facilities because this is our parish. It is the property of the congregation, not the archdiocese, "she said, trembling as she read a statement on Monday.
