"Our results indicate that there appears to be a skin tone preference in regards to job selection," Harrison wrote. "This finding is possibly due to the common belief that fair-skinned blacks probably have more similarities with whites than do dark-skinned blacks, which in turn makes whites feel more comfortable around them."

"I think what was most shocking to me was to find that dark-skinned black males with greater credentials were still recommended less — or seen as less of a candidate — than light skinned blacks with worse credentials," Harrison told BlackAmericaWeb.com.
