NO PLEASURE WITHOUT LABOR

Some polemics argue that but for the disobedience of cour first parents, we should now be living in a play-day instead of a work-day world. Yet labor seems so essential to the happiness of the human family as at present constituted; that one can scarcely conceive of true en joyment without it. We don't believe that Adam was ever an idle man, or Eve, an indolent woman.

When we are past work, the remembrance of our labors; if they have been honourable and useful, is the chief solace of our retirement. Does a man derive the same pleasure from the possession of wealth, when he has received it as an inheritance, that he would have derived from a competence won by the sweat of his brow or the energy of his brain? We trew not. The veteran merchant takes comfort in the recollection of his business enterprises, when the pastimes and recreations of his youth and maturity seem to him "stale, flat, and unprofitable." Yes, the memories of labor are sweet. Fathers, if you desire the real happiness of your children, set them to work-endeavour to give them a relish for employment. No matter how rich in this world's goods you may be able to make them, you are not their friends, but their worst enemies, if you bring them up in idleness.

ASTRONOMY.

One of the most wonderful achievements of astronomers is the weighing of the bodies comprising the solar system. The mass of the sun is 359,551 times greater than that of the earth and moon, and 700 times greater than the united masses of all the planets.

A flash of lightning on the earth would be visible on the moon in a second and a quarter; on the sun in eight minutes; on Jupiter, (when furthest from us,) in twenty five minutes; on Uranus, in two hours; on Neptune, in four hours and a quarter; on the star Vega, of the first magnitude, in 4,000 years; yet such stars

are visible through the telescope. La Place, the great French astronomer, says: "I have ascertained that between the heavenly bodies all attractions are transmitted with a velocity which, if it be not infinite, surpasses several thousand. times the velocity of light." His annotator estimates that speed as being eight millions times greater than that of light.

Daniel Webster once remarked: "Small is the sum that is required to patronize a newspaper, and amply rewarded is its pation. I care not how humble and unpretending is the gazette which he takes. It is next to impossible to fill a sheet with printed matter without putting in it something worth the subscription price. Every parent whose son is away from home at school, should supply him with a newspaper. I well remember what a marked difference there was between those of my schoolmates who had and those who had not access to newspapers. Other things being equal, the first were always superior to the last in debate, composition and general intelligence.

THE FALLS OF THE PALOUSE

A writer in an Oregan paper fornishes a description of the falls of the Palouse river, to which he recently made a visit. The falls are fifty miles from Walla Walla. Their exact height is not known, owing to the difficulty of making an actual. measurement. For miles above and below the falls the river is confined to a narrow canyon, several hundred feet in depth. Approaching the falls the chasm makes a sudden turn to the west, when the whole volume of water is precipitated in a single sheet into a basin below. The height of the fall is estimated at one hundred and ninety feet. It is possible to reach the foot of the fall by going some distance down the river, descending into the chasm and clambering over the rocks up the stream. The basin below the fall Solon Robinson, Rev. Bishop is about five hundred feet across, and nearly circular in form. This fall is somewhat similar to that on the Snoqualmie river, a stream which enters into Puget Sound opposite Whitby's Island. The fall on the Snoqualmie is, however, at least one hundred feet higher than that on the Palouse. The streams are about equal in size. Washington Territory can therefore boast of two falls which in point of grandeur can hardly be surpassed by any in the world.
