All statements or assertions to the contrary are without foundation and hould be totally disregarded.

Second—All products purchased by parties other than cotton, can be shipped to the Northern market by simply paying the regular Government fees and duties to the Customs officer. ONE FOURTH of the cotton purchased and offered for shipment must be delivered to the Purchasing Agent; the remaining three-fourths can be shipped WITHOUT CHARGE. No seizure, whatever, will be made of any article a person has the right to purchase

or ship.
