THE CORNER-STONE OF THE COM FEDERATE MONUMENT LAID IN THE PRESENCE OF A LARGE CONCOURSE OF PEOPLE, EX-ERCISES OF THE MOST IMPOS-ING CHARACTER AS TRIBUTES TO NORTH CAROLINA'S LAMEN-TED DEAD.

To-day was ushered in bright, beautiful and cool. 'At 5 o'clock the booming of cannon announced the occasion was at hand, when the long delayed act of justice to those who laid down their lives in the cause of the South was to be consummated.
