### CONDUCTOR'S DEATH.

#### CAPT. SAUNDERS' SUDDEN CALL

A Popular Employee of the Southern Died Yesterday Afternoon

Capt. R. J. Saunders, for years a conductor on the Southern's main line, died yesterday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock at his home at Spencer. Recently Capt. Saunders has been a conductor on the Spencer yard and his popularity was co-extensive with his number of acquaintances. He had been slightly ill for several days but his condition caused no alarm and it was expected that he would be out in a few days. He took a sudden change for the worse yesterday afternoon, however, and in a few moments was dead, death being caused by the rupture of a blood vessel. The remains were prepared for burial and taken to Manchester, Virginia, his old home, for burial, this morning on No. 30. The funeral services will be held to-morrow afternoon.

Capt. Saunders was 40 years old and is survived by his wife and five children, who, with friends of the family, accompanied the remains to Manchester.

### BARNS CLOSED CHRISTMAS

Two Have Already Decided to Have Closed Doors on Christmas Day

Salisbury should, if it is not, be a dry town on Christmas day. The saloons have for several years remained open but a few hours Christmas morning; but this year's movement is on foot among the proprietors to lock their doors for good from Sunday night until Tuesday morning. R. L. Mabe and W. H. H. have made announcement of their purpose to keep closed doors Monday.

### MR. COPMAN RESIGNS

Well-Known Southern Trainmaster Gives up His Position

Mr. W. J. Copman, the Southern's trainmaster located at Greensboro, and so greatly esteemed by Salisbury railroad men, has resigned his position. Monday's Greensboro Record says: Mr. W. J. Copman has tendered his resignation, effective at once, as train master on the Southern Railway in charge of the Greensboro-North Wilkesboro and Mt. Airy-Sanford branches. This action is taken by Mr. C. a man on account of ill health, having been a sufferer from asthma for a long time.

Mr. Donnelly has been away from here about eight years and said he saw great improvements in the city. He added that he had a warm spot for Salisbury. He leaves tonight for his home in Stany.

#### Mr. Grubb Sells 173 Bales of Cotton on His Farm.

The magnitude of Mr. C. Grubb's cotton crop has not been nearly told even though the Post has taken note of his recent sale of 76 bales here. Without knowing the weight of a single bale, the Post guessed the worth of this lot to be \$4,410 when in reality was \$4,418. Mr. Grubb has scores of bales yet to market, and in all his crop is going to bring him \$9,000, the entire amount of acreage producing 173 bales. It is certain that no one farmer in the Piedmont section of this State can touch this colossal crop. It simply shows the possibility of this soil and what one man of energy and brains can do.

### ROWAN COUNTY POLITICS

How Things Were Done Here Thirty Seven Years Ago

The Post is indebted to Capt. A. Buford for a copy of the Henderson Gold Leaf of the 14th inst., which contains extracts from the Greensboro Patriot from June 1833 to June 1834. The article was prepared by T. T. Hicks, Esq., one of the State's leading lawyers. Mr. Hicks says that a letter from Salisbury giving an account of the election of 1833 says: "God forbid that you should have seen as much rascality carried on in your county as we had in this borough and old Rowan. They stole free white men and locked them up with as little ceremony as they would kidnap or capture a negro upon the coast of Africa. They bribed, bought votes wherever they could find them for sale and treated with whiskeys as long as a drop could be found. They beat Burt Craige in the borough, but they cut Hamner Jones in the county, and elected full teams of Nullifiers. Since then we have had nothing but talk about dueling pistols, broad swords, corncobs, popguns and quirts."
