WIDOW DIES OF BURNS. FOLLOWS ONLY CHILD.

BODY WAS A BLISTER. MOTHER AND WIFE ALONE.

Ethel Williams Succumbs to Injuries Received Yesterday.

Mr. James B. Rex Dies of Pneumonia Yesterday Afternoon.

Ethel Williams died at 10 o'clock this morning from the injuries received while making preparations to start from her father's home on South Long street school yesterday morning. The sufferings were fearful. Dr. Caldwell eased her pain after resorting to the administration of heroic remedies. The little one was practically dead from the waist to the

The father spared by death that loss, consuming grief for the only child such as parents bereft of their only offspring know; the wife and mother widowed and childless all within a week tells in a few words the tragedy that has darkened the home of James B. Rex—Jim Rex is the way the world knows him—a well-to-do farmer of Locke township.

The child was a favorite with school mates and teachers. Her former little playmates were greatly depressed all yesterday after hearing of her frightful experience.

On Friday of last week Mr. and Mrs. Rex lost their only daughter—a pretty and promising girl of fourteen. Their hearts' whole affection was given her and they were crushed by this great sorrow. The child had been sick but four days of pneumonia. The funeral was held Monday and Mr. Rex had hardly returned home from the cemetery when he was stricken. Pneumonia claimed the father, too, and yesterday evening he died. That mental depression caused by the death of his little girl contributed to the speedy termination of Mr. Rex's illness is not doubted.

A SMASHUP ON CAR LINE, DIED WHILE ON A VISIT.

Cars Came Together on Chestnut Hill This Morning.

Two cars on the Salisbury-Spencer electric line came together on Chestnut Hill this morning and the smaller of the cars was badly smashed. No one was hurt, however.

THE MAIN LINE BLOCKED NO. 38 WRECKED LAST NIGHT

All the Trains North and Southbound are Badly Off.

By an accident last night to No. 38, the Southern's fast and crack northbound train, between Hotsburg and Linwood and about nine miles from Salisbury, the Southern's main line was blocked from midnight last night until 11 o'clock today. There was no possible outlet and impatient passengers were compelled to accept the situation philosophically. No. 39 was the first train to come in from the North. It arrived at 11:30, more than five hours late and the other trains held up by the block followed at intervals of 15 minutes.

Washington, Nov. 17.—Peary, the Arctic explorer, is considered the possible successor to Rear Admiral M. T. Endicott as chief of the Bureau Yards and Docks. The latter retires Nov. 26. Should Peary ask another leave it is possible that either Commander E. H. Holiday or Lieut. A. C. Cunningham will be chosen. During Peary's twenty-five years in the navy fourteen have been on leave.

Shrinks \$138,000,000.

New York, Nov. 16.—Standard Oil stock reached a new low point for 1906 today over the news of the government's action in St. Louis, where the bill of complaint in the suit to dissolve the corporation will be filed tomorrow. The stock sold at 52 1/2 a decline of 13. It closed slightly higher at 59 1/2, showing a net decline for the day of 10 points.

JURY HOLDS INQUEST.

The Citizens Who Hunted "Harris" Down are Accorded Thanks.

Asheville, Nov. 16.—At the inquest held over the body of Will Harris, alias Rufe Lindsay, the desperado who was shot to death by a posse of officers and citizens yesterday, the coroner's jury returned the following remarkable verdict:

THE REMARKABLE VERDICT.

"We find that Will Harris, alias Rufe Lindsay, came to his death at the hands of public-spirited citizens who at the time were in the fearless and unselfish discharge of a public duty that the law might be vindicated and justice administered; that said Will Harris, alias Rufe Lindsay, at the time of his death was resisting arrest and attempting to shoot and kill the citizens above referred to constituting the posse who were attempting, under due authority of law, to effect the capture of the said Will Harris, alias Rufe Lindsay.

Just exactly what caused the wreck of thirty-eight is not known. Three cars left the track and the passengers were badly shaken up. Engineer Joe Steadman was also bruised but not seriously hurt. It was persistently rumored on the streets this morning that both he and his fireman had been killed. The obstruction has been partially removed and the operation of trains tonight will not be interfered with by reason of the wreck.

Two Brakemen Killed.

Columbia, S. C., Nov. 16.—Two brakemen named Lloyd and Chesney were killed in a head-on collision between a freight and work train on the Western near Dent. Customers in their bodies to call.

BAD PLACE IN TRACK.

A track was built around the main line to admit the passage of trains. No one was injured.

Davis and Wood Elected.

Morganton, N. C., Nov. 16.—At a meeting of the Chairmen of the Election Boards of Burke, Caldwell, McDowell and Alexander counties, comprising the 34th Senatorial District, to canvass the vote for Senators, it was found that B. F. Davis, Democrat, was elected by 48 majority and W. F. Wood, by a majority of 10 votes.

Carouso Doesn't Appear.

New York, Nov. 17.—Sener Enrico Carouso, arrested yesterday for disorderly and indecent conduct, did not appear in court today. His counsel explained that the Senator was suffering from sciatica. Mrs. Graham, the complainant was not at court. Carouso is said to have collapsed completely.

Bishop Galloway Will Rest.

Jackson, Miss., Nov. 16.—Bishop Charles E. Galloway, of the Southern Methodist church, has consented to relinquish all labor until he is completely restored to health. He will leave for Florida in a few days.

Fairbanks Coming South.

Washington, Nov. 17.—Vice-President Fairbanks is here for the first time since the close of his campaign tour. He will leave Monday for Tampa, Florida, accompanied by Mrs. Fairbanks, to make an address at the opening of the midwinter fair.
