## A CAR LINE TO RIVER.

## A FRANCHISE IS SECURED.

Piedmont Carolina Railway Company  
Has Big Things in Sight.

If the owners of the property to be touched by the line offer encouragement to the Piedmont Carolina Railway Company, a car line will be built from Salisbury by way of the fair grounds to South River, one of the most delightful spots in the State. The railway people stand ready to put up their share but they declare the line would entail too great expense to justify them in building and operating it unless they receive subscriptions from the parties whose property will be greatly enhanced in value. Subscriptions are now being solicited and this seven mile line to the river promises to take shape in a short while.

The franchise given the company by the county commissioners yesterday reads as follows:

Ordered by the Board of County Commissioners of Rowan county that the franchise and right of way are hereby granted to the Piedmont Carolina Railway Company, its successors and assigns to construct an electric, trolley, steam or horsepower street railway from Ford's Mill on South Yalquin river, along the line of the new Mocksville road to Salisbury, N. C. and along Innis street under the franchise granted to the said Piedmont Carolina Railway Company, by the City of Salisbury in the intersection of Innis street and Long street to a point on or near the intersection of Long St. near the Miller's Ferry road (passing through the town of East Spenser) and from said point at or near the intersection of Long street and the Miller's Ferry road, along the line of the Piedmont toll bridge on the Yalquin river; said railway to be constructed under the supervision of the Board of Commissioners of Rowan county.

The said franchise is granted for the period of sixty years provided said Piedmont Carolina Railway Company shall replace in as good condition as before any portion of the public road removed during the construction of said railway, and shall keep that portion of the road next to the track in good condition, and provided further, that said Piedmont Carolina Railway Company shall begin work on or before the first day of October, 1907, and shall have that portion of said railway from the junction of East Spenser of Newton street and Long street, along the line of Long street to its intersection with Innis street and from said intersection along Innis St. to its intersection with Main street ready for use on or before the first day of June, 1908.

## ENGINEERS GET RAISE.

## A SUBSTANTIAL INCREASE.

Passengers Men Get 10, Freight 9 per Cent Increase.

Spencer, N. C., May 6.—Effect of once the locomotive engine on the Southern Railway through the system have been granted an increase in wages amounting to 10 per cent, for passenger engineers and 9 per cent for freight men and fifty cents and 45 cents respectively an hour for overtime. In the aggregate the pay roll of the engineers will be increased by thousands of dollars and it is highly satisfactory to the employees.

## 38 SPLITS A SWITCH.

## A WRECK NEAR LEXINGTON.

All Southern Trains Held Up for Ten Hours.

No. 38, the Southern's through Northbound train, split a switch near Lexington last night, and as a result all traffic was blocked for more than ten hours. The train was running slowly when it neared Lexington and but for this fact the accident would have been much more serious. As it was Engineer Rowan, of Spencer, was slightly injured, and his colored fireman, Lee Vaughan, was badly hurt. The engine turned over and several cars were derailed.

A wrecking crew was sent to the scene of the wreck at once but progress was rendered slow by the nature of the wreck. Passenger and freight traffic was badly demoralized, all trains being held up until after 10 o'clock this morning.

## FIREMEN WANT A STEAMER.

## ELECTION IS QUIET.

## CLOSE CONTEST AT SPENCER.

Thomas Slightly in the Lead This Afternoon.

The municipal election has been unusually quiet today and the vote small. Up to 4 o'clock the promised opposition to the Democratic nominees had not shown its hand and it is not thought there will be any votes cast against the nominees of the primary held on the 10th of April.

At 4:30 o'clock the votes cast by precincts were as follows:

South Ward . . . . . 87  
At Spencer at half past four o'clock the vote was 119 for Thomas and 99 for Pethel.

At both places the polls close at 81 minutes past 6 o'clock—sundown.

## TAX LEVY THE SAME.

## COMMISSIONERS IN SESSION.

Mrs. Patterson Reports Home But Whites at County Home.

The county commissioners met in regular session yesterday and had a busy day. Chairman Kerns returned from New York, where he has been under treatment, especially to attend this meeting. Sheriff Julian reported that he had collected \$81,500 of the 1906 taxes, \$72,766.34 of which was general and \$8,733.66 special tax.

A number of citizens appeared before the board and asked that the fill on the new Mocksville road this side the railroad be filled. C. S. Carter reported 32 convicts, 30 of whom are colored in his camp; Superintendent Hartley reported 13 colored and 3 white convicts at his camp.

The supervisors were ordered to put the roads in shape immediately in their respective territory. C. T. Beruhard, resigned as a member of the board of assessors of Salisbury township, and P. B. Beard was elected in his stead. Others who resigned and their successors are: John W. Miller, Morgan, vice A. A. Morgan; V. C. Edminton, Mt. Ulla, vice Carl Sherrill; J. S. Harrison, Steele, vice J. S. Hall; Geo. Lips, China Grove, vice C. J. Deal.

Mrs. Patterson reported thirteen inmates of the county home, all of whom are white. Klutz & Rendlman were awarded the contract for supplies for chain gang No. 2.

A fee of 25 cents is allowed for each person vaccinated and the board requests the city of Spencer to pay one-half the cost of all persons vaccinated there.

A petition was presented from citizens of Litaaker township asking that a new road be built from Paul Yost's to John Clark's store. The road was ordered and upon its completion the old road will be closed.

P. A. Hartman was chosen chairman during the absence from the city of Chairman Kerns. The tax remains as last year with the exception of the road tax which is increased 5 cents.

Dr. I. H. Foust was re-elected county superintendent of health at the same salary.

## KILLED AN ENGINEER.

## TRAIN ROBBERS DO MURDER.

Dispute But Fails Attempt to Take \$100,000 From Train.

Denver, Colo., May 7.—A special from Butte, Montana, says a desperate effort was made to hold up the Northern Pacific's crack flyer the Northeast Limited at Welch's Spur, 15 miles from Butte. Engineer Frank C. Calw of Butte was killed, and his fireman, name unknown was wounded. Five men were in the party of highwaymen. They halted the flyer at Welch's Spur by means of a red lantern placed in the center of the track. When the train stopped the robbers sprang from a ditch covering the engineer and fireman with their rifles and telling them that resistance meant certain death. At that time three others sprang toward the express cars. According to report \$100,000 currency from Seattle, Portland and Spokane, was aboard for the East. The robbers fled after killing the engineer. Seeing that their plans had miscarried they made no effort to enter the mail or express cars.

## WOULD PREVENT FRAUD.

## NATURALIZATION BUREAU.

The President Seeks to Prevent Anticipation of Fraud.

Washington, May 7.—The president has decided to establish a naturalization bureau in several of the leading cities as a preventive of anti-election frauds. Assistant Attorney General Cooley, after his return from a trip west to investigate conditions, will recommend men for appointment as chiefs for the various bureaus. The idea is to compel all petitions for naturalization to be submitted to a board consisting of one chief and several inspectors.

## Popular Spencer Brakeman Victim of an Accident.

Brakeman Frank Alexander, a popular young railroader, of Spencer, lost a leg last night in an accident at Greensboro. The young man, it is reported at Spencer, fell from his train and his leg was severed from the body. He is doing well today in St. Leo's hospital.

The large steam distillery just across the State line in Carroll County, Va., and about six miles north of this city, goes out of business today, on account of the fact that the authorities of Patrick have refused to grant further license to do a business of this kind. ## FOUR KILLED IN WRECK.

## FOG OBSCURED THE FLAG.

Death in a Collision on the B. and O. To-day.

Wheeling, W. Va., May 7.—Four persons were killed and injured in the wreck of the New York and Chicago express on the B. & O., at Roslyn's Point, 20 miles east of here this morning. The wreck was caused by a heavy fog, the engineer of the passenger train being unable to see the flag the other train had out.

The killed were: Christian A. Weaner, aged 25, baggage master of train No. 7.

W. T. Thomas, of Wheeling, a fireman.

J. L. Painter, express messenger.

Charles Christie, a fireman. Among the injured passengers were: Miss Sarah Summers, of New Jersey, slightly cut about head.

Miss Mollie Hill, of New Jersey, injured about the head. All the injured are expected to recover.

A freight was pulling into the switch when the passenger thundered along, the engineer not seeing the flag on the freight and crashing into it. All the passenger cars were overturned. A relief train was sent from here.

## ON THE UNWRITTEN LAW.

Washington Judges Poke Fun at Southern.

Washington, May 7.—Council for Mrs. Annie E. Bradley, indicted for the murder of former Senator Brown, of Utah, will probably object to Justice Stafford, of the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia, presiding at her trial on account of Stafford's open attack on the "Unwritten law." In address recently Stafford ridiculed the idea of "temporary insanity," and declared it cowardly. The justice said he admired the man who defied the law for a great principle like John Brown.

"Put that man (referring to Brown) beside the Southern gentleman who shoots down another and asks the jury to justify his crime because of brainstorm," said Stafford.

## DEFAULTER SENTENCED.

Stole \$100,000 and Gets But Six Years in Pen.

Birmingham, Ala., May 7.—Alex Christelm, the defaulting teller, who took \$100,000 from the First National Bank, was found guilty today and sentenced to six years in the Atlanta penitentiary.

## KILLED AN ENTIRE FAMILY.

Murdered Father, Mother and their Four Children.

San Francisco, Cal., May 7.—W. C. Davis, an insane man, ran amuck in a crowded thoroughfare today, killing six members of one family.

The victims were a man and a woman and three boys and a girl ranging in ages from six to fifteen. Davis barricaded himself in a house and defied arrest. Finally he was subdued after a severe beating.

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
