Today's Birthday Honors. Le Roy Percy, Democrat, of Greenville, Miss., was born November 9, 1860, in Washington county, Miss., his father being William A. Percy and mother Nannie I. Percy; was educated at the University of the South; and graduated from the law department of the University of Virginia in 1881; returned to Mississippi and began the practice of law at Greenville; elected by Legislature of Mississippi to fill the unexpired term of Senator A. LAWS CARRIED DAVIDSON.

Had Majority Over Page of 55—Craig for Governor, Ran Ahead of Wilson.

Lexington, Nov. 9.—The board of canvassers completed their work late this afternoon and some interesting figures are the result. Contrary to the expectations of Democrats, neither Wilson nor Craig carried the county. Wilson received 2,484 votes, Taft 1,509 and the Roosevelt 1,143. A surprise to the Bull Moosers was the showing of T. R., who fell 400 votes behind Taft, and of Iredell Meares, who polled only 567 votes in the county against 2,118 for Settle and 2,505 for Locke Craig.

For congress R. Don Laws led over Mr. Page by 55 votes. For the state senate in the 26th district R. E. Little and Wade H. Phillips, Democrats, ran a few votes behind Parker and Gilbert, Republican candidates. The fight for the house was close, Ivey G. Thomas winning over his Republican opponent, T. E. McCrary, by 30 votes.

C. C. Shaw, of Denton, Democrat, was elected sheriff by 52 votes, defeating C. W. Miller, who has been register of deeds for four years. Walter S. Anderson, Democrat, was elected register of deeds over Fred C. Sink, Republican, by a majority of 22. Both of these offices have been held by Republicans for the past six years, and the Democrats are rejoicing mightily over their hard won victory.

E. A. Rothrock, Democrat, was re-elected treasurer by a majority of 113 over M. R. Harris, Republican. John W. May, Democrat, was elected surveyor by a majority of 71. Dr. J. W. Peacock, of Thomasville, was re-elected coroner, defeating his Democratic opponent, Dr. C. M. Clodfelter, by 32 votes. The Republicans also elected all three of the county commissioners. The new commissioners are Messrs. A. M. Hiatt, D. S. Siceloff and A. C. Smith who led their Democratic opponents by majorities ranging from 35 to 155. A. M. Hiatt led the ticket with 2,702 votes to his credit.

JOSHUA AND THE PROMISED LAND.

The Brotherhood Bible Class meets in St. Luke's Chapter House on Sunday morning at 10 o'clock. All men, strangers especially, cordially invited. Lesson: Josh 3:1-17. Golden Text: Ps. 107:7. Hon. John S. Henderson furnishes the following comments: The sojourn in the wilderness had accomplished its purpose. The Hebrews whom Joshua led were not the weak and undisciplined multitude whom Moses brought out of Egypt, but were a hardy army of warriors trained by the outdoor life of the desert and the mountains. Joshua had given many evidences of his courage and skill, when he was a comparatively young man. He had been closely associated with Moses as his servant and friend. He was the guardian of the Tabernacle; he was the zealous defender of Moses' prestige when Eldad and Mead seemed to menace it. He was one of the spies who viewed the Promised Land, and it was he, who, with Caleb, braved the wrath of the excited Israelites, when they were afraid to undertake the conquest of Canaan. For thirty-eight years, therefore Israel dwelt in the wilderness, until all of those men who had shown such cowardly conduct had died. He was now an elderly man, but he combined the enthusiasm of youth with the sagacity of age. As the successor of Moses, Joshua was commissioned to conquer the Canaanites, and to allot their territory to the tribes of Israel. He was both general and judge. The book of Joshua tells us how faithfully and well he accomplished both tasks. Joshua was not defeated; what he planned he carried out. If Joshua had not conquered Canaan the work of Moses would have failed. The great vision which Joshua beheld when encamped before Jericho was symbolic of his appointed task. "Behold there stood a man over against him with his sword drawn in his hand." Most failures are the result of lack of careful preparation. Israel prepared carefully to cross the River Jordan. Man did his part as well as he could, and then God did His. When we do our best God always blesses our efforts. God fulfills His promises, when we fulfill His conditions. Moses was the inspiration of Joshua. It is a great thing as to live as to be an inspiration to those who come after us. Every servant of Christ should aim to leave a spiritual impression upon some other life. "One goeth and another cometh." The worker dies, but God's work goes steadily on. He never removes one of His servants without having another ready to take his place. Death is the last barrier between us and our Heavenly Canaan; and our safety in the last hour depends on our obedience in life. There-

fore it is our duty to listen when Christ speaks and to heed what He says.

Prison Congress Meets.

Baltimore, Md., Nov. 9.—The annual meeting of the American Prison Congress began here today in McCoy Hall. Much interest in the meeting because of the recent appointment by Governor Goldsborough of a commission to investigate the conditions at the Maryland Penitentiary.

About six hundred delegates are in attendance. Among them are some of the noted philanthropists, criminologists and practical prison administrators of the country.

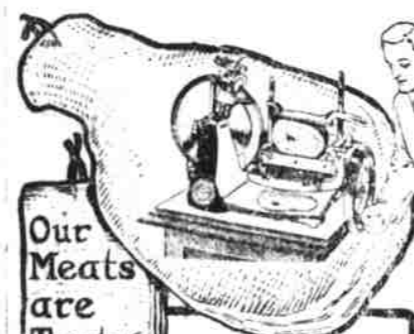
