### ROWAN TAXABLES SHOWS

State Tax Commission Report Received Here—Rowan Went From \$11,788,496 to \$12,101,669—Tredell Makes Substantial Increase. The State Tax Commission has just issued its report and the same gives the increase assessed in valuation of property in each county in the State. Rowan stands well up with the counties showing an increase, the increase being \$313,173. For 1914 the assessed valuation of property in Rowan was \$11,788,496 and for 1915 it is \$12,101,669. Tredell's taxable values increased \$263,278. In 1914 that county returned property to the amount of \$8,206,419 and in 1915, it is \$8,469,697.
