MEN VACCINATED.

Major Flannigan Goes to Statesville After More Men-Soldiers Well Situated and Getting On Fine.

Major R. L. Flann'gan of the First North Carolina regiment now stationed at Camp Glenn, Morehead City, was in the city a short time this morning going to his home at Statesville where he will endeavor to secure recruits for the regiment.

Major Flannigan says there are about 2,500 troops at Camp Glenn and that they are getting on fine. There has been little or practically no sickness among the men, especially in the First regiment. Many of the men are feeling the effects of vaccination, 800 in the First regiment having been given the typhoid vaccine and this was closely followed by administering the smallpov vaccine.

The members of the First regiment, having been the first to arrive at camp, had choice of location and were given the old camp quarters. which have every convenience. The weather has been hot and dry at the camp and it has consequently be n somewhat dusty.

Major Flannigan is of the opinica an that the First as well as Second and Third regiments will be sent to the Mexican border, though just when this will be done he would not venture a prophecy.
