Spencer, Feb. 11.—East Spencer has a new chief of police and town marshal, Mr. J. I. Williams, a well known citizen, having been elected to office by the board of aldermen at a recent meeting. He has already been sworn into office and has municipal matters well in hand. Mr. Williams succeeds Mr. J. H. Kesler, who had been an officer of the town for some four or five years.

Fire which originated from a defective stove flue did about \$1000 damage at the home of Mr. Jack Mowery in East Spencer shortly before noon today. The blaze was discovered in time to save the residence by the use of garden hose. The firemen were called but the fire was under control when the company reached the scene.

The East Spencer school building is being wired for electric lights and other improvements are being made to the plant. Principal H. J. Peler, who is also mayor of the town, states that the school which has an enrollment of 250 will continue until the last of May or first of June and that fine work is being done. Under the direction of Mayor Peler the town is having some much needed repairs made to Long street running through town.

The Churchland Telephone Company is the name of a new concern just organized at Churchland, Davidson county, with O. T. Davis as president and S. R. Simmerson as secretary and treasurer. The building committee which has charge of the extension work is composed of G. M. Sharpe, Lloyd Fitzgerald and G. O. Walser. The stock desired has been subscribed and it is said the exchange will be in operation in a short time with more than 100 phones connected. A switch fee of \$3 per year is to be charged and there will be no other assessments. The switchboard will be located in the home of Mrs. Hermap Barnes at Churchland.

the principles to be applied are as said, was simple and obvious and follows:

"One—Each party to the final settlement must be based upon effectual justice to bring a permanent peace.

"Two—Peoples and provinces are not to be bartered about like chattels to establish a balance of power.

"Three—Territorial settlement must be for the benefit of the peoples concerned and not merely for adjustment of rival state claims.

"Four—Well defined national aspirations must be accorded all possible satisfaction.

"A general peace upon such foundations can be discussed.

"Until such a peace can be secured we have no choice but to go on."

These general principles, the President said, have been accepted by everyone except the military autocrats in Germany.

The President was interrupted by applause at every mention of the United States standing steadfastly against a patched up peace. Probably the greatest applause broke out when the President declared the militarists of Germany were the only elements now preventing a world peace.

Cabled to All Governments.
Washington, Feb. 11.—Following the custom inaugurated with other addresses of its kind President Wilson's words will be cabled by the government to all principal capitals of the world. In this way the government hopes to get the answer to Hertling and Czernin to the ears of the people of Germany, Austria and Russia.

FEBRUARY TERM OF ROWAN SUPERIOR COURT OPENS

Judge B. F. Long of Statesville, is Presiding and Court Will be in Session Two Weeks.—Mr. P. D. Linn Foreman of the Grand Jury.

Rowan Superior court, February term, convened this morning at 10 o'clock with His Honor, Judge B. F. Long, of Statesville on the bench and Solicitor Hayden Clement prosecuting the docket for the state. Immediately after court convened the grand jury was drawn and Judge Long delivered his charge to this body, covering in a general way the duties of the jury and explaining the laws and what constituted violations of these. Just before noon the charge was completed and the criminal docket was at once taken up. There are no cases of any real public interest or importance to be tried at this term.

The court is a two week one, this week being for the hearing of criminal cases and next week will be devoted to civil docket.
