The new groups of projectors were discovered from aerial photographs taken by American observers in the French airplanes. The American artillery on this front has been more active than ever in the past 15 hours, and its shells also found lodgment in a number of ammunition dumps, which were blown up. Many extensive explosions are reported. The correspondent, standing on a hill, witnessed one dump situated in a wood, go up in a brilliant flash and a great puff of whitish smoke, a' tremendous report following a few seconds later. Explosions and fires also were caused by our 639.16 shells in villages and a number in the woods behind the enemy front. Silence German Batteries

During a retaliatory shelling for an enemy bombardment in which a number of gas shells feil or our battery positions, the American guns silenced certain German batteries by pouring 134,085.80 in a fast and extremely accurate fire. 136,264.28 Our artillerymen stayed in their dugfall, when they put on their masks store. and manned the guns while thus protected. Some mustard gas shells were mixed with the others that fell and later a few of our men walked through this type of gas without their masks

> The American artillery also tore great gaps in the enemy wire and levelled various portions of the first and second line trenches, forcing the enemy virtually to abandon them.

Details of the recent raid which has just been developed, show that while numbers of Germans were killed by shell fire when the box barrage was in effect and others later by the reeping barrage, there were also a few of the enemy shot here and there during the time our men were in the trenches. Ther were many Amricans among the raiding party of four officers and 70 men who did not see a single German soldier. ----- W S S

# IREDELL AND CABAR-RUS COUNTY BLOCK-ADE STILLS SEIZED

One Hundred Gallon Liquor Making Outfit Taken in Iredell and One Hundred and Fifteen Gallon Outfit Found in Cabarrus.

Statesville, March 14.-Sheriff M. P. Alexander, with Deputies Privette and Woodsides, made a raid into the northern part of the county yesterday in quest of a blockade still. Their trip was not in vain, for about 4 p. m. they came upon a complete distil ling outfit, which contained a 100-gallon sheet-iron still, with cap and worm, six large stands for fermenting beer, three 10-gallon kegs and four harrels, in addition to several other accessories consisting of a saw, hammer, mattock, buckets and fruit jars. The outfit was not in operation when the officers arrived, but evidence disclosed that the operators had "run out" not earlier than the night before There was no one present when the officers arrived, but sufficient evidence was secured to warrant the apprehenion of the parties who were operating the plant and their arrest will be made within a day or so, it is said. Big Still Taken Near Concord.

Concord. March 14 .- A 115-gallon copper still three and one-half gallons of whiskey and a large quantity of malt was seized Wednesday night by Deputy Collector W. C. Lisk during a raid in township five, Cabarrus county, about seven miles from Conaccording to information rought back to Charlotte last night by Crecial Policeman Dwyer and Paxon, who were yesterday, in Concord in official business. The day before, Deputy Collector Lisk captured a smaller still, some contraband malt and a "blind tiger" in another raid, he told the Charlotte officers. The capture of the large still, and one of copper, was regarded by the Charlotte policemen as a feather in Collector Lisk's cap.
