RUSSIA ADOPTS THE PEACE TERMS (Continued from page 1)

action that she may take. Japan, he said, would act as a friend of Russia and the allies, and it is the intention of Japan to help Russia to save herself from the enemy and to preserve the revolution.

American troops have made their first prominent advance on the western front into German lines. North of Badozilliers, in the Luneville sector the trenches of the enemy abandoned after a conflict with the Americans, have been consolidated with the American first line trenches. Repeated attempts to retake the positions have failed, the Germans being driven off by the American gunners and the Germans were forced to give up their trenches. The new position gives the Americans high ground from which to operate against the enemy.

Badozilliers is 8 miles west of the German frontier and almost opposite to Strasburg, the capital of Alsace. The American position is about 18 miles west of the Rhine-Meuse canal where the Americans first entered the trenches last November.

On both the Luneville and Toul sectors the American artillery has been throwing many shells into the German positions. To the North of Toul the German plan to make a gas attack was frustrated when the American gunners destroyed a group of projectors placed in position. German batteries, trenches, wire entanglements and other military targets are being harassed by the heavy fire of the American fire.

Fighting is active on the British front from Ypres towards Arras. Between Ammentiers and Oermiello for about fifteen miles the German artillery continued intense on yesterday as it has been for the past several days. Strong German detachments attempted to raid the front, but were driven back by British and Portuguese troops. On the South sector of Ypres the Australians have succeeded in throwing back the raids of the Germans and have raided into German lines. Severe artillery fighting is recorded on the French front where the French have repulsed the raids attempted by the enemy.

Donny Mainz Was Fired. Amsterdam, March 15.—The French assertion that wires were hit and fires caused in the air raid upon Mainz last Saturday has been denied in Hessian parliament by Herr Adelung, a socialist member, according to a Darmstadt dispatch to the Frankfurter Zeitung. The member stated, however, that ten persons were killed and material damage done the city by the raiders.

Fierce Battle in Turkestan. London, March 15.—A fierce battle between Soviets and Germans and natives has occurred in Turkestan, according to an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Petrograd under Wednesday's date. More than 20,000 casualties are reported to have resulted.

MEDICAL SOCIETY MONTHLY MEETING

Rowan Medical Organization Takes on New Life and Will Be More Active in the Future—Clinics By Drs. Whitehead and Monk.

The Rowan County Medical Society held its regular monthly meeting in the Empire hotel parlors yesterday. The society, which recently taken on a new lease of life and great enthusiasm was hewn at the meeting. Realizing the distance from the leading medical centers and the difficulties of visiting these clinics, the society decided upon an unique course. This course was to bring the work of the leading clinics here, where the doctors of the county could have the opportunity of gaining valuable experience, from the work done by the leading medical men of this country. This enables the local doctors to become familiar with the new methods of diagnosis, the new methods of treatment and be kept right up-to-date with the present day medical progress.

It was a question at first if the course would be interesting and inviting enough to attract the attention of the doctors. This clinics as conducted by Drs. John Whitehead and H. L. Monk, from the material sent from Dr. Richard Cabot's clinic at Boston, have created marked enthusiasm in the society and these clinics will be given monthly from now on.

An added feature to the program yesterday was an address by Dr. A. J. Warren, laying before the society the scope of the county health work. In this work Dr. Warren asked for the co-operation of the medical men individually and collectively. This co-operation was readily promised. Dr. Harold H. Newman read a paper on "The Clinical Relation of Systolic Blood Pressure in the Diagnosis of Certain Acute Circulatory Conditions."

MAKING LAYERS OF GRAPES

Operation May Be Done by Bending Shoot Down and Burying Part in Shallow Trench.

Layers of Concord and Niagara grapes may be made of the present season's growth by bending a shoot down and burying a portion of its length in a shallow trench about one inch in depth. Cover with rich earth. The extreme end of the layered shoot should be tied to a stout stake in an erect position. By fall the layered shoot will be rooted and it may then be cut off from the parent vine. This is a good way to grow extra vines.

BURN DEAD TREES IN WINTER

Particular Attention Should Be Paid to Those Killed by Borers to Destroy Insects.

Oak or other trees that have died during the year, especially if they have been killed by borers, should be removed and burned this winter. If left till spring the insects will lay eggs in healthy trees and perhaps cause their destruction.

ORCHARD USED FOR PASTURE

All Right for Sheep, Calves and Poultry, but Horses and Cattle Should Be Kept Out.

Cattle and horses should not be allowed to graze in the orchard, as they not only tramp the sod hard, but will eat the tender shoots of the trees. The orchard may be used as a pasture for sheep, calves and poultry, but not for horses or cattle.

For a time it looked as though the flames would get the better of the firemen as the water pressure at first was hardly sufficient to force the water to the roof. However, this pressure soon became stronger and the fire was extinguished after a small part of the roof had been burned off. There was also some damage by water.

Much of the furniture was removed from the home and saved from damage by water and smoke. Just how the fire originated was not learned, but it must have been from a spark on the roof or a defective chimney.

FRENCH AND ITALIAN SHIP LOSSES LIGHT

Washington, March 14.—Little damage to the French and Italian merchant fleets was done by submarines or mines during the week ending March 9. Official dispatches from Paris and Rome today said the French lost no ships of over 1,600 tons and four below that size, while the Italians lost two vessels of over 1,500 tons and one below. One Italian ship was unsuccessfully attacked.
