### GERMANY AND AUSTRIA DIVIDE UKRAINIAN GRAIN

Washington, March 14.—According to an official dispatch received from Copenhagen today and quoting from The National Tidende, Germany and Austria will divide equally until July 31 the amount of grain available in Ukraine. During the early part of this period Austria will have two-thirds and Germany one-third of all grain obtained. During the second half the proportion will be reversed.
