brai salient, isolate the British troops farther east and regain the Hindenburg line, from which they were driven on November 22, 1917, by General Byng's sudden blow. Subsequent dispatches have proved that this was, indeed, the plan of the German general staff. The fighting on the rest of the 50-mile front was but a side issue to the terrific onslaught aimed at Gauche wood and Lagincourt, the south and north bases of the salient. There is no data upon which it is possible to estimate the success attained by the Germans to the south, but names of towns where the armies were battling on Friday, show that on the northern side of the salient the Germans bent the British line back about two and a half miles. It was reported that St. Leger was the scene of a hard struggle and that Doignies had been re-taken by the British. These points are about four kilometers, or 2.48 miles, back of the British lines, as they stood before the attack began. Berlin claims that British first line positions from Arras to La Fere were captured.
