Dinner Given Major Dupont.

Mrs. Edwin R. Overman entertained at a most brilliant dinner last evening, immediately after the reception in honor of Major Dupont and Madam Darros Pimentel. The affair was beautiful in every detail.

Maj. Dupont at Community Building. A large, eager and expectant audience awaited the distinguished speaker at the Community building at 7:30 p. m., last evening. The meeting was presided over by our school superintendent, Mr. T. Wingate Andrews.

The gracious prima donna of Salisbury Mr. R. Kyle Smith, accompanied by Miss Julia Crouch, sang with much power and feeling, "When the Boys Come Home Again."

Major Dupont, using perfect English, gave a most interesting and thrilling recital of the war in France. The audience literally hung on his words. He expressed felicitly his joy over the fact that American soldiers are fighting side by side with French soldiers. At the conclusion of his address, Maj. Dupont was asked to sing the Marseillaise, the most magnificent battle cry of the world. By the singing with his wonderful voice and feeling, he drew his audience still closer to him. When he concluded, a burst of applause, led by the old "Rebel Yell" in the mouth of Col. Boyden, filled the Community building. The demonstration continued so long that Maj. Dupont had to sing again the closing stanza.
