Cotton Shows Renewed Firmness.

New York, Sept. 3.—The cotton market showed renewed firmness at the opening today. Strong Liverpool cables, inspiring character of the war news and reports of internal trouble in Bulgaria, combined with continued expectations of bullish government

crop reports, served to stimulate demand. Liverpool was a good buyer while active covering and moderate selling orders from the South were readily absorbed at the opening advance of 50 to 95 points. October contracts sold at 35.40 and January at 34.70, making gains of 88 to 90 points shortly after the call.
