

# Report of Red Cross Activities in Influenza Epidemic

## INFLUENZA REPORT

On October 5, Mr. W. F. Snider, president of the Salisbury Chapter American Red Cross turned over to me as acting director of woman's work during the illness of Mrs. E. W. Lurt, all correspondence in regard to the formation of an influenza emergency committee, and on October 7 he appointed the following committee: Mrs. Lyman A. Cotten, chairman; Mrs. A. J. Warren, Mr. John E. Ramsey, Mrs. Mary O. Linton, Miss Mary E. Henderson, Mrs. E. W. Burt, Mrs. E. C. Gregory.

Measures for the suppression of the disease and the alleviation of the epidemic, then in its incipient stages, were immediately inaugurated. That the immediate relief work was organized in detail was plainly demonstrated by the fact that no change at all was necessary. A tremendous effort was made at once to secure the services of trained nurses. This was found to be impossible; at no time during the entire epidemic could a single trained nurse be secured. It was fought from start to finish by volunteers.

The first step was a call for volunteer nurses, to which many at once responded. The first canvass of the situation revealed the fact that it was necessary to supply food to the stricken families, therefore Mrs. J. E. Alexander, commandant of the Salisbury canteen A. R. C. was placed in charge of all food supplies. Mrs. Alexander received the hearty co-operation of the ladies of the canteen service, and food was supplied by them through October 15, supplemented by delicacies prepared by Mrs. Linton and Miss Olive. On October 14 Mrs. Alexander asked the president, Mr. W. F. Snider, to be relieved of all further responsibility. On October 16 the sole preparation of food, the absolute necessity for which was hourly increasing, was placed in the competent hands of Mrs. M. O. Linton and Miss Lida Olive, home demonstrator for Rowan county. She had previously received permission from Mrs. McKimmon, state home demonstration agent, to spend her entire time upon work for the epidemic. Miss Olive gave her room in the Community building to be used as a Red Cross diet kitchen. This kitchen, under the skilled management of these two ladies, who gave their devoted and untiring labor to the work, became the pride of the city and every delicacy for the very ill and the convalescent was prepared by them each day. The kitchen remained open from 10 to 15 hours daily. I give a typical list of the dishes served: Chicken soup, beef broth, mutton broth, vegetable soup, potato and other creamed soups, chicken and beef loaf, beef hash, beef hash with hot sauce, hot bread, baked custard, cooking of various kinds, rice pudding, creamed baked apples, lemonade, milk and butter milk. When the work was taken over on October 16 by Mrs. Linton and Miss Olive we were feeding from 60 to 80 people a day, but in two or three days we were feeding from 130 to 180 daily. This continued until November 1 after which the demand was rapid. The diet kitchen was closed on November 5; the volunteer nursing ceased on November 7. From Tuesday, October 29 to Saturday, November 2 Miss Louise Neave filled the place of Mrs. Linton in the diet kitchen, who was called home by illness, thus rounding out a career of usefulness, including nursing and all other branches of the service.

Mr. John H. Gorman, who took in charge the making of the garments, answering hurried calls at any hour, supplied with promptitude and cheerfulness the allotment needed for each day until it was longer necessary.

Upon the first call for help the Salisbury Red Cross Motor Corps, through Captain Mrs. E. C. Gregory, immediately volunteered its services and worked both early and late in the distribution of food, the carrying of nurses to and from their homes, and countless allied errands of mercy. Calls in the early morning and late at night were answered without a question. It should be a peculiar gratification to the motor corps, so recently organized, that its initial efforts should have been of such paramount importance. Mrs. Gregory, who had worked with never flagging devotion through all the early days of the epidemic, was most unfortunately called out of town on Wednesday, October 16, by the illness of her son. As captain of the motor corps, she appointed Mrs. Mary E. Henderson and Miss Grace Overman to command the corps in her absence, which position they filled with efficiency and the utmost devotion to duty. From the organization of relief work, Miss Henderson had also held the position of executive secretary to the chairman of the influenza emergency committee. An immense burden of work fell upon her. This she accomplished with dauntless energy, and the chairman feels that the success of the relief movement is largely due to her ability and exactitude. With the motor corps must be associated the ladies who volunteered to assist in distributing the food to the stricken families. This committee supplied each day workers to go out into the homes of contagion. Often there was no one well enough to receive the food, and in such cases the workers served the patients before leaving the house. Through the first two weeks of the epidemic Salisbury extended its relief work to Spencer and East Spencer. Some of the most pitiable cases being found in these localities. Mrs. L. M. Hand gave me invaluable assistance before

the relief work was taken over by East Spencer. Nurses were also provided for two desperate cases in China Grove and Landis. It should be stated that in most instances families of from two to ten members were absolutely helpless, every one in the family ill, and not a soul even to give them a drink of water.

I have now come to the most vital department of our relief work, the department of volunteer nursing. Of these women and men I cannot say too much. Their unselfishness and devotion was heroic. I place it on a par with the merciful and humane work of the nurses at the front. They performed this work with no thought of self, and with almost no realization that they were doing anything out of the ordinary run of the day. During the four long weeks of the violence of the epidemic, with very few exceptions, I visited, and in many instances visited repeatedly, all the cases needing help that were reported to me. I therefore feel that I can speak authoritatively and I shall ever feel grateful that it should have been my privilege to come in intimate contact with such selfless unselfishness. Not only were their motives fine and high, but most of all their work was effective. Dr. Warren, the county health officer, says frankly that he attributes our low death rate to the effectiveness of the volunteer nurses, to the proper invalid diet prepared, and the general efficiency of the Red Cross work. These women not only did the nursing, but in many instances cooked, brought in wood and coal, and water, and washed and ironed clothes. Many such acts of unselfishness are known only to me, to the patients and to God. Grateful mention must be made of Mrs. T. M. Flowers of the Salvation Army for her noble work in behalf of a suffering and destitute infant. Especial mention should be made of the quickness with which Mrs. Burt and the surgical dressings room provided masks for the thousands for Salisbury, Spencer, Rowan and Stanly counties, and the passing troops, models were sent Cabarrus county. This was in addition to its usual monthly quota of work. The work under the direction of Mrs. Walter Blackmer as supervisor provided sheets, pillow cases, flannel undergarments and other necessities, and proved of invaluable assistance.

Early in the epidemic the president of the Red Cross through the local press called for a fund to be used for relief work. The response was generous and spontaneous. Mrs. Leo Wallace was made custodian of this fund, and the sum of \$1,214.50 was contributed.

This report would not be complete without a grateful mention of the wholehearted support given the work of relief by the Red Cross secretary, Miss Anne Neave, who in addition to her ordinary work, unobtrusive enough at all times, performed many other duties, notably the high duty of volunteer nursing.

Gratitude is felt for the support given by the press, through the editor of the Salisbury Evening Post, Mr. J. P. Hurler, and the editor of Woman's Work, Mrs. W. H. Wiley.

Salisbury should feel proud of the faculty of her public schools for the principal and a large percentage of the teachers worked faithfully and devotedly throughout the entire epidemic, showing the finest type of civil loyalty. The Red Cross work of relief was also greatly facilitated by the generous co-operation and encouragement of the county health officer, Dr. A. J. Warren, the board of health and the board of physicians.

I do not feel that I can omit from this report a reference to the fine service given by the operators of the telephone company of Salisbury. They gave prompt and loyal attention at all times and at all hours. The working day of the chairman averaged 18 hours until the last three days of service. For three weeks the only hours free from telephone calls were those from 1 to 6 in the morning. Without the sympathetic co-operation of the ladies in the telephone office her work would have been greatly hampered.

The following statistics will be interesting:

Number of families supplied with food—144.

Number of people supplied with food—568.

This means that these families were taken care of for a period of from one to three weeks.

Homes investigated not needing help—150.

Number of homes in which nurses were placed—71.

Number of persons nursed—279.

Number of volunteer nurses—78.

Number of paid nurses (not trained)—5.

This does not mean that we had at any one time anything like this number. Fifteen is the greatest number we could call upon on any single day. This means 15 for both night and day nursing. A few of this number only worked one or two days others throughout the epidemic without interruption through the epidemic month. Near the close of the epidemic we had very few nurses to call upon, many being physically exhausted others having contracted influenza. I should like to add that the paid nurses, four of whom were necessary in their work in the most satisfactory manner. They were of the greatest assistance to the committee.
