SPENCER Y. M. C. A. SECRETARY RESIGNS

Spencer, Sept. 14.—Mr. M. J. Henry has resigned as general secretary of the Spencer Y. M. C. A. after about ten years of hard work for the association and for the present will rest up. He has not decided whether he will re-enter the association work and has not made plans for the future. To fill the vacancy caused by his resignation the board of directors has chosen Mr. A. S. Morgan as acting general secretary who is now in charge of the plant. With a record as nine years as trainman, nine years as a conductor, in road service, and 12 years in the service of the Y. M. C. A. Mr. Morgan comes to Spencer highly recommended. He has been one of the secretaries of the international committee for several years and is a man of wide experience. He has spent much of his time in Canada and the West, his family, wife, two daughters and a son, now living in Canada. Former General Secretary Henry will remain with the association in Spencer for a short time assisting Mr. Morgan in the details of the work. Mr. Henry states that it is with regret that he gives up the work principally on account of his health feeling the need of a rest from long confinement and long work hours. Mr. Henry is popular with all classes of men in and around Spencer, where he is well and favorably known. He has many strong friends who hope he will again take up association work.

SOUTHERN RAIL PEACE NEGOTIATIONS SATURDAY

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE)

upon the railroads and relieve the country from the adverse effects thereof and to expedite the movement of essential traffic, the following memorandum of agreement is made upon the understanding, which the parties hereto accept, that the terms hereof shall be carried out by the officers of the companies and the representatives of the employees in a spirit of conciliation and sincere purpose to effect a genuine settlement of the matters in controversy referred to below. This paragraph does not apply to or include strikes in effect prior to July 1, 1922.

"2. All men to return to work in positions of the class they originally held on June 30, 1922, and at the same point. As many of such men as possible are to be immediately put to work, at present rates of pay, and all such employees who have been on strike to be put to work or under pay not later than 30 days after the signing of this agreement, except such men as have been proven guilty of acts of violence which in the opinion of the commission, hereinafter provided for, shall be sufficient cause for dismissal from service.

The Relative Standing

"3. The relative standing as between themselves, of men returning to work and men laid off, furloughed or on leave of absence, including general chairmen and others who were as of June 30, 1922, properly on leave of absence, will be restored as of June 30, 1922, and they will be called back to work in that order.

"4. If a dispute arises as to the relative standing of an employee or if any other controversy arises growing out of the strike that can not be otherwise adjusted by the carrier and said employee or the duly authorized representative thereof, the matter shall be referred by the organizations parties to this agreement, the employee or the carrier in the interest of any employee who may be aggrieved, to a commission to be established and constituted as hereinafter provided, for final decision by a majority vote.

"5. The commission referred to in paragraph 4 thereof shall be composed of six representatives to be named by the chief officers of the organizations parties hereto and six railroad officers or representatives selected from and by the railroad agreeing hereto. This commission shall be constituted within 15 days from the signing of this agreement and shall have jurisdiction to decide all cases that may properly be referred to it on or before May 31, 1923, but not thereafter.

Compromising Controversy

"6. Inasmuch as this agreement is reached for the purpose of composing in a spirit of compromise this controversy, all parties hereto agree that neither this settlement nor any decision of the commission above provided for, shall be used or cited in any controversy between these parties or between the railroads signing the same, or any other class or classes of their employees in any other controversy that may hereafter arise.

"7. Both parties pledge themselves that no intimidation or oppression shall be practiced or permitted against any of the employees who have remained at work or have taken service or as against those who resume work under this understanding.

"8. All suits at law now pending as the result of the strike to be withdrawn and cancelled by both parties."

MAN AND WIFE RECOVER \$2,000 FROM PROH. OFFICER FOR INJURIES

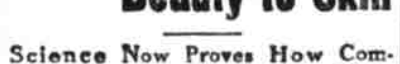
