

SUNDAY-SCHOOL UNION.

THE COLORED PEOPLE MEET AND DISCUSS CHURCH AND SUNDAY-SCHOOL WORK.

The Northampton Upper Bound S. Union, assembled at Zoar Missionary Baptist church on Saturday, Oct. 29, 1892, with Pres. Henry Worrell in the chair who read from CXIX Psalm. Prayer by G. W. Deloatch. The President then made an address of welcome.

The minutes of last session read and approved.

On motion of E. D. Parker the constitution was read and adopted, Sype Deloatch, A. E. Deloatch and Isaac Garris were appointed a committee on arrangements.

The roll of schools and delegates was then called and the following delegates were in attendance: Allen Hill—J. C. Stephenson, Alice Flythe and B. L. Stancell; Oak Grove—G. W. Deloatch, Sype Deloatch and Pennie Britt; Zion Hill—J. Stancell, A. J. Deloatch, Rebecca Deloatch and J. Stephenson; Mt. Hill—T. H. Hayley, N. T. Calvert and Thomas Deloatch; Jerusalem—E. D. Parker; Potocasi B. W. Langford and T. H. Edwards.

Mike Branch, Alice Flythe, E. D. Parker, J. Stancell and G. W. Deloatch were appointed a committee on time and place of next meeting. J. C. Stephenson, T. H. Hayley and B. W. Langford were appointed committee on Credentials.

The committee on arrangements reported as follows: To meet at 10 a. m., adjourn at 1 p. m.; meet at 2 p. m. adjourn at pleasure.

A recess was then taken after which Sype Deloatch, Rev. S. G. Newsome, L. B. Strayhorn, J. L. Hayley and Rebecca Deloatch were appointed committee on program.

The following committees were also appointed: auxiliary, resolutions, temperance, board of managers and assessment.

The committee on program then made a report of the work and discussions for this session.

A resolution offered by Rev. S. G. Newsome was adopted that each Sunday-school, belonging to this Union take up a special collection for the benefit of the Orphan Home at Oxford and foreign missions and home missions.

The committee on time and place of meeting reported that next session be held with Jerusalem church at Woodland on Saturday before fifth Sunday in January, 1893. Adjourned till to-morrow at 10 o'clock.

SECOND DAY'S SESSION.

Met as per adjournment; Rev. S. G. Newsome acting as president. Prayer by B. W. Langford.

The question of the county Sunday-school convention then came up and after a long discussion it was decided that there was no Sunday-school county convention in existence and that this union was organized in its place as a reformed convention under the name of "The Northampton Upper Bound Union." A committee was appointed to look after the money and property belonging to the old county convention.

A resolution was adopted that no person be allowed to take part in this Union unless he or she be in full fellowship with his or her church.

Miss Julie L. Hayley was elected Missionary for this Union after which an address was delivered by Rev. H. Clements.

A collection was taken up for State Mission and Orphan Asylum which amounted to \$5.02.

A resolution was adopted that no person that is not a member of any Baptist Church or Sunday-school have no voice in this Union and that Baptist send their children to no other Sunday-school than those taught by Baptist teachers.

After transacting other routine business the Union adjourned to meet as above mentioned.

Meteors.

The heaviest authentic meteorite in any collection is the one discovered in 1816 at Bendego, near Bahia in Brazil; it weighs 11,792 pounds. A model of it was shown at the Paris exposition of 1889.

To these meteors, weighed, analyzed and classified, we may add two other planetary fragments which are still larger. One weighing more than 22,000 pounds fell in China near the source of the Yellow River, and is fifteen meters high. The Mongolians, who call it the rock of the north, say that the mass fell at the close of a meteoric shower. The other lies in the plain of Tucuman, South America, and weighs about 33,000 pounds. An Arizona meteor has been found which contains minute diamonds.

From time immemorial iron must have fallen from the sky, for the earliest known iron implements fashioned by man were made of meteoric iron, and sideros, the old name by which this was known, signifies star as well as iron.

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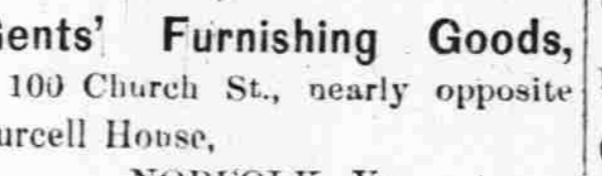
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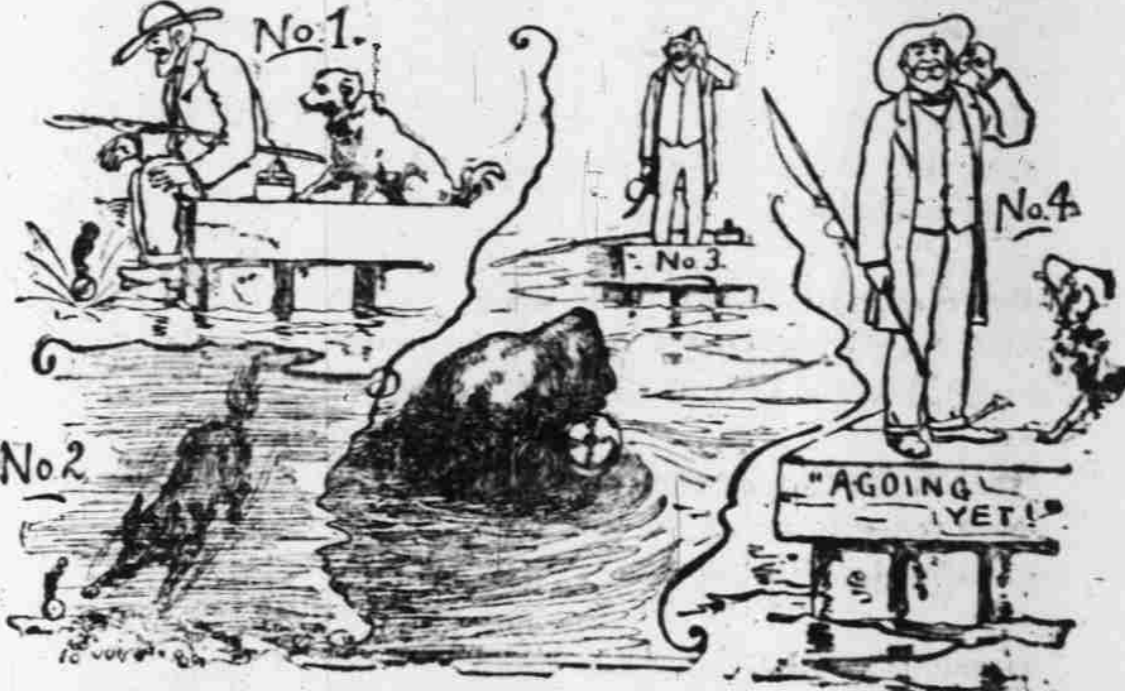
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
