FROM "HARDTIMES"

MAKES GOOD SUGGESTIONS TO FARMERS AND DISCUSSES COUNTY OFFICERS.

In my travels and from what I have seen and heard, the corn crops in Northampton look exceedingly well. The cotton is very sorry and from evidences bids fair for about a half crop, though favorable weather from now can make marked improvement. The peanut crop is hardly an average; the fruit crop is a complete failure. There are a few knobby apples; we will sadly miss our peaches. What say you now, Mr. Bageley? You seemed to be quite hopeful, and never despair. I will be up to Jackson soon and I hope your Early Ripes will be ready for trial.

The hog cholera is playing distraction in some sections. My remedy is liberal feeding in the months of May, June, July and August. Those are hard months on hogs. Those are the dry months and hogs are often forced to drink stagnant water, such as they find in the ditches and holes with a green scum on it. Is it any wonder that we have diseased hogs?

Mr. Editor, this is the election year, and your name is mentioned by several for the Representative of this county; also Mr. B. S. Gay and Mr. I. P. Parker. Now, Mr. Editor, I have no objection to you or Mr. Parker, but would prefer Mr. Gay, as he can get the best vote of any man in the county; it is no use for me to say anything in his behalf; the people know him; he is a bold, fearless, out-spoken, Christian gentleman, and can nor will not betray a trust. I would to the great God, that our Representatives in congress and in the Senate were endowed with such a spirit. In my travels I find that the people are proud of our county officers. Our Superior Court Clerk is a young, kind, able, Christian man, and our people are ready to support him, not only for clerk of the court but for any position that he might ask for. Let there be a full gathering and truthful expressions of opinion and preference everywhere.

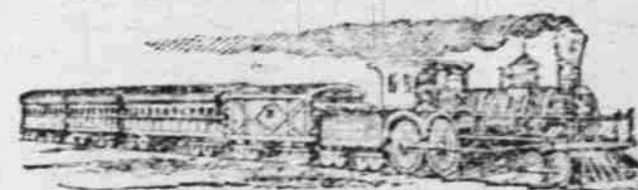
