On the first Monday in September a Superintendent of Public Health for Northampton county will be elected to serve for two years. All reputable physicians in the county, the Mayor of Jackson, the Chairman of Board of County Commissioners and the county surveyor constitute the board of electors. See Sec. 2879 of the Code.

Weather Crop Report.

The reports of correspondents of the Weekly Weather Crop Bulletin, issued by the North Carolina State Weather Service for the week ending Monday, August 20, 1894, indicate the continuation of favorable conditions in the Western and Central Districts, but there has been too much rain in the Eastern District. The days have been warm, with alternating showers and sunshine; the nights are beginning to get cooler in the west. A number of local storms of hail and of heavy winds were reported from the central and eastern portions of the State, injuring crops, etc., over limited areas. Cotton is opening freely in the south; curings of tobacco are generally good.

Eastern District.—There has been too much rain for all crops. Cotton reported to be shedding badly. Weather very unfavorable for fodder pulling. Curing tobacco has generally been successful up to this time. Though damaged some by recent rains, the corn crop will be fine. Rice reported fine. Other crops, such as sweet potatoes, peanuts, grasses, etc., are generally good. Rain fall reported: Jacksonville, 3.45 inches; Sladesville, 0.75; Clark, 3.50; Currituck, 1.25; Wilmington, 0.94; Robersonville, 3.45; Falkland, 2.26; Rocky Point, 1.50; Teachey's, 4.00; Mount Olive, 1.50; Columbia, 1.45; Lumberton, 2.19; Newbern, 1.02; Weldon 0.81.
