NEW LIQUOR LAW.

All Persons Ordering Liquor are Now Required to Have it Shipped in Their True Name. It is no longer lawful for persons living in dry territory to order whiskey in the name of some other person or under a fictitious name. The new liquor law passed by Congress went into effect January 1st, and is as follows:

"Section 288. Any officer, agent or employe of any railroad company, express company or other common carrier, who shall knowingly deliver or cause to be delivered to any person other than the person to whom it has been consigned, unless upon the written order in each instance of the bona fide consignee, or to any fictitious person, or to any person under a fictitious name, any spirituous, vinous, malted, fermented, or other intoxicating liquor of any kind which has been shipped from one State, Territory, or district of the United States or place noncontiguous to but subject to the jurisdiction thereof into any other State, Territory, or district of the United States, or place noncontiguous to but subject to the jurisdiction thereof, or from any foreign country into any State, Territory, or district of the United States, or place noncontiguous to but subject to the jurisdiction thereof, shall be fined not more than five thousand dollars, or imprisoned not more than two years, or both.

"Sec. 239. Any railroad company, express company, or other common carrier, or any other person who in connection with the transportation of any spirituous, vinous, malted, fermented, or other intoxicating liquor of any kind from one State, Territory, or district of the United States, or place noncontiguous to but subject to the jurisdiction thereof, into any other State, Territory, or district of the United States, or place noncontiguous to but subject to the jurisdiction thereof, shall be fined not more than five thousand dollars, or imprisoned not more than two years, or both.

"Sec. 240. Whoever shall knowingly ship or cause to be shipped from one State, Territory, or district of the United States, or place noncontiguous to but subject to the jurisdiction thereof, into any other State, Territory, or district of the United States, or place noncontiguous to but subject to the jurisdiction thereof any package or packages containing any spirituous, vinous, malted, fermented, or other intoxicating liquor of any kind, unless such package be so labeled on the outside cover as to plainly show the name of the consignee, the nature of its contents and the quantity contained therein, shall be fined not more than five thousand dollars, and such liquor shall be forfeited to the United States, and may be seized and condemned by like proceedings as those provided by law for the seizure and forfeiture of property imported into the United States contrary to law."
