that they should keep their eyes on the books from sun up to sun down. I have seen the pictures of school houses and the grounds around the school houses that the Northern children have up in New York and Massachusetts. Are they any better than we are that they get these fine buildings while we have the dirty little huts, called houses in North Carolina, or is it that the men up there think more of their children than our fathers think of the children down here? Up there they have all kinds of nice things on their school grounds. Down here we are not even encouraged to do a thing to make our grounds pretty. Those Northern children learn to do many things that fit them for life work and fit them to get the cotton at 15 cents a pound and sell it to us for \$1.50 a pound after they have run it through a spinning machine and a weaving machine.

But there is a change for the better. When both of our county juries offer to give valuable pieces of machinery like the De Laval cream Separator to the children of the schools to sell and to use the money in putting up swings and other play things, it does seem that there is a mighty change coming for the good of our children, and Mr. Boylin, every child in the county and every child born in the county hereafter will have cause to honor your name and remember you with gratitude for the part you are taking; and, as your paper has such an influence for good, I know you will be able to get the men of Anson to realize their error in not doing more for the education of their children, the fitting thing for life work.

Mr. Boylin, I tell you this getting subscribers for the M. & I. is getting real exciting; there are hundreds of children at work and the grown up people say they are about to pay out all their money for subscriptions.

Mr. H. told me he had paid for two more years in advance. He said Jimmie, who is a little friend of his came and begged so hard he had to subscribe for a year, and that Sallie, who is his special pet came and said she had only secured six subscriptions and wanted to work up to ten and that if she could only get him to help her out she would feel so much encouraged, so he gave her a dollar for a subscription so that made twelve dollars. But Mr. H. said he could well afford to help out the school because he was also helping out a good newspaper enterprise and a good man when he was helping you. He certainly thinks a great deal of you. I think before we get through that a great many men will have paid in advance many years. But turn about is fair play, Mr. Boylin. Father says you have credited some men for as long as five years and now if they pay you five years in advance that it is nothing but advancing up old obligations to you. Especially can they afford to do this when they are helping the schools of the county and also taking part in the "Good Butter Making Enterprise." Can you tell me, Mr. Boylin, why you haven't urged the farmers long before this to make good butter and get thirty-two cents a pound for it. Did you not know about it years ago? You have traveled and seen many places and it does seem as though you ought to have done this years ago. But I won't quarrel with you, about it because you are doing the right thing now. You must keep this thing up, you must urge the farmers to keep good cows instead of the poor old raw boned, long-horned scrub stock of by gone days.

Brother keeps kicking, but he will go out with me, he's kinder "skeery" in going towards Ansonville. He says those people up there will surely bounce me if they find out who I am. Mr. Boylin, I haven't said anything against them. They are real good people, they have only forgotten about their school. They are not going to let us have our \$800 school building and they only a \$600 building and a part of that money comes from the county fund and take as a gift part of the betterment money to help build a house. These people are rich and they are not going to be classed among the beggars of the county or the betterment association—I know that much.

BUTTER MOLD CONTEST.

Butter Molds Made by Children to be Brought to Wadesboro on the Sixteenth of April.

On the occasion of the awarding of the two De Laval Separators to the schools having obtained the greatest number of subscribers to the Ansonian and Messenger and Intelligencer, the prizes for butter mold making will be given to the boys and girls of the public schools. In competing for these prizes all children who have attended school this winter can compete no matter if their schools have already closed. The name and age of the child, and what school it attended, the rural road address, and postoffice should be written on each mold so as to identify the molds for returning to those who made them. A written certificate reading as follows must accompany each mold: "I, _____ the (father or mother) of _____ certify that (he or she) made this butter mold."

All those who made ax handles last year on which no prize was awarded are requested to call on Mr. E. F. Fenton at the Wood and Iron Works building and get their handles unless they desire them to remain on exhibition. The handles are now on exhibition in the Anson County School Betterment Association's Work Room, where they are greatly admired and praised by many people from all over the country. These people greatly admire the work done by Anson's children and don't hesitate to express their admiration for their skill.

Their is to be given to the boys and girls of Anson, by Capt. J. T. Patrick, forty-nine dollars and fifty cents in cash, which is to be divided into 12 prizes for butter mold making.

Ten dollars to girl of school age, five dollars to boy; eight dollars to girl under 15, four dollars to boy; six dollars to girl under 13, three dollars to boy; four dollars to girl under nine, two dollars to boy; three dollars to girl under seven, one dollar and fifty cents to boy; two dollars to girl under six, one dollar to boy.

All molds to be uniformly same size, three inches wide by four and one-half inches, inside measure, and four inches deep. Any thickness of plank, the sides of tobacco boxes, or any kind of dressed plank will do. A little box with no top or bottom, represents the mold. A piece of board, one-half inch thick that fits neatly into box with hole bored in centre to fit handle, completes the mold except the carving on the last named piece. It is a very simple thing to make.

Parents, it is not the money that the child gets, that is of the greatest value. The value comes in getting the children of Anson to using tools, in taking their first lesson which teaches them to be manufacturers and thereby keeping in the South the millions that are spent for toys, agricultural implements, from a jews' shop to grand piano. Until we start in and teach the children and young folks how to make things and establish industries, we may expect to be hewers of wood and drawers of water for the people, who, by their foresight, already have these factories. We get 15 cents per pound for our cotton in a raw state and then pay those people for manufactured goods fifty cents to twenty dollars a pound.

Now, my countrymen, do you want your children to continue in these ruts. If not, encourage the ladies and gentlemen who have this most important movement well under way.
