

A GREAT VICTORY

DEMOCRATS SWEEP COUNTRY

Democratic Governors Elected in New York, New Jersey, Massachusetts and Connecticut—House of Representatives Safely Democratic and Several Senators Gained.

Elections held throughout the country yesterday resulted in a political convulsion of far-reaching extent, similar at many points to the famous tidal wave of 1882, and apparently more widespread in its effect.

The indications toward midnight were that the National House of Representatives had been carried by the Democrats, reversing the present Republican majority of 43.

The United States Senate probably will have a reduced Republican majority as a result of legislative elections held in many States.

In New York State John A. Dix, Democratic candidate for Governor, is elected over Henry L. Stimson, Republican, by a plurality of about 55,000, reversing the Republican plurality of 70,000 in 1908 for Governor Hughes.

In New Jersey Woodrow Wilson, Democratic candidate for Governor, is elected over Vivian M. Lewis, Republican, by about 15,000 plurality, reversing the previous Republican plurality of 8,000 for Governor Fort.

In Massachusetts, Eugene N. Foss, Democratic candidate, has defeated Governor Eben S. Draper, Republican candidate for re-election, by about 30,000 plurality, reversing Governor Draper's former plurality of 8,000.

In Connecticut, Judge Simeon E. Baldwin, Democratic candidate, is elected Governor over Charles A. Goodwin, Republican candidate, by about 4,000 plurality, reversing the previous Republican plurality of 16,000.

In Ohio, Governor Judson Harwood, Democratic candidate for re-election, appears to have carried the State by about 15,000 over Warren G. Harding, Republican candidate.

In New Hampshire, Robert H. Bass, Republican candidate for Governor, is leading Charles E. Carr, Democratic candidate, by about 6,000 plurality.

In Pennsylvania, the election of John H. Tener, Republican candidate for Governor, is claimed by a large plurality.

In Rhode Island, Governor Pothier, Republican candidate for re-election, is slightly in the lead over Lewis A. Waterman, Democratic candidate, with a plurality much reduced from that of 1909.

In Tennessee the Fusion candidate, Ben W. Hooper, is apparently elected by 16,000 majority.

Democratic Governors have been elected in Alabama and South Carolina.

In Iowa the Democrats claim the election of Claude R. Porter for Governor, but this is not yet conceded.

In Wisconsin the election of Republican candidate for Governor, Francis E. McGovern, is claimed by reduced majority and the return of Senator LaFollette to the United States Senate is assured.

In Michigan Chas. S. Osborne, the Republican candidate for Governor, appears to have a safe lead over L. E. Hemans, Democrat.

LATEST RETURNS.

The political upheaval of Tuesday was followed yesterday by a general survey of the field, which disclosed with greater detail and precision just what results had been accomplished.

Latest calculations on the national House of Representatives, based on complete but unofficial returns, show that the Democrats will have a safe working majority of 30.

The outcome of the United States Senate is now definitely settled. The Republicans are assured of 16 new Senators, which, with 34 holdovers, gives them a total of 50.

The Democrats are assured of 15 new Senators, which, with 25 holdovers, gives them a total of 40.

Two Senatorships are still in doubt, namely, the successor of the late Mr. Dooliver in Iowa, and of Mr. Carter in Montana, where there is prospect of a tie.

These determined totals, however, leave a Republican majority in the Senate as follows:

Total membership 92; necessary majority 47; Republicans 60; Democrats 40; doubtful 2.

The 18 Republican Senators considered assured are from California, Connecticut, Delaware, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Michigan, Nevada, North Dakota (2), Pennsylvania, Rhode

Island, Utah, Vermont, Washington, Wisconsin and Wyoming.

The 15 Democratic Senators considered assured are from Florida, Indiana, Louisiana, Maine, Maryland, Missouri, Mississippi, Nebraska, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia and West Virginia.

A summary of the contest for governorships shows the following Democratic Governors elected, with the approximate plurality:
