THE BOOK NOOK FOR BOOK LOVERS

The Grace of Lambs by Manuel Komroff, Boni, and Liveright, N. Y.

The much abused word charming has its correct and accurate use like the much over-worked word used with discretion...

Back of each story—there are fourteen of them—is a subtle but impressive philosophy which haunts and delights the reader long after the story itself has been perused...

Each of the narratives moves with celerity and grace, which may be illustrated by the opening paragraph of The Dark Cloak:

"Losoff, the powerful blacksmith, had led a simple and quiet life until one early morning for no apparent reason at all he strangled his wife, ran to the police and cried: 'Arrest me, I killed her!'"

The last story, How it Feels to be Free, appears in the September Atlantic. There is a uniform merit about all the stories frequently lacking in such collections...

Altogether the book is a masterpiece of the short story art. The author reminds one strangely of Maupassant, Kipling, and Chekhov, all in one.

These stories conform to the formula. Each is as beautiful as a life, nearly faultless, and

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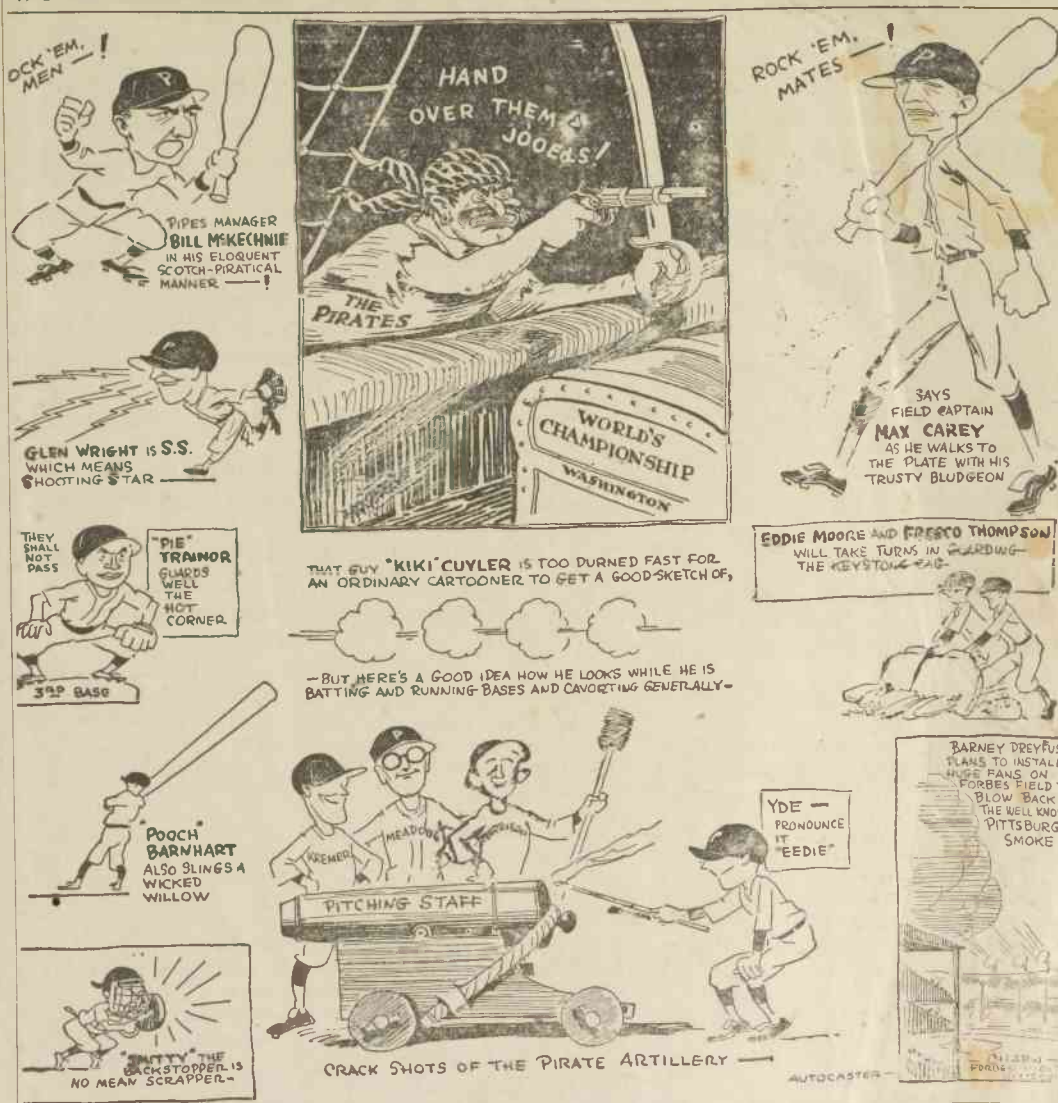

STUDENT GOVERNMENT FUNCTIONING NICELY

The student government seem to be functioning in a manner that reflects credit upon its executives. Commendable order is being maintained among the students, although it is not approaching the perfection that promises anything like dispensing with the rules and discipline. The freshmen are falling into line of college discipline without any hitches or trouble. Freshman training in preparation for membership in the Student Government Association, conducted by upperclassmen, is proceeding, and at a very early date they will appear before the council for examination and formal reception into the organization. The minds of the council and the Dean of Women are apparently active in planning so that each student may enjoy every liberty and privilege possible while taking into consideration her best welfare and protection against infringement by her neighbor student. The handbooks have been through a process of revision, and a number of additions and subtractions have been made. It will go to press soon.
